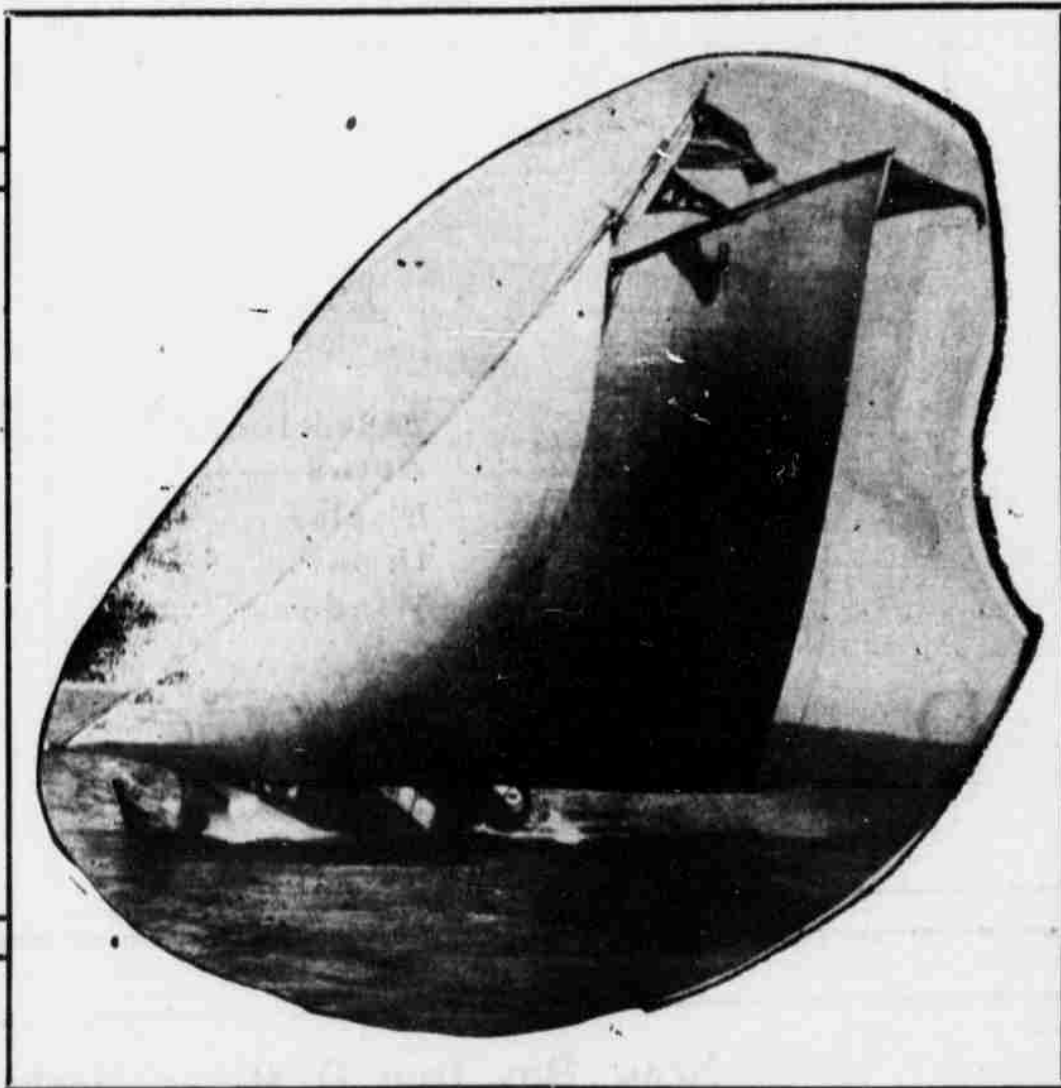

500 PEOPLE MOB PRIEST

Trustees of Church Had Been Arrested for Taking Possession of Church Keys.

POLICE DISPERSED THE MOB

Polish Members Objected to the Priest's Appointment and Determined to Keep Him Out of Church.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Aug. 15.—A mob of 500 people has besieged Father Walters of the Polish Catholic church at Plains near here. After the police had been defied and repulsed, Sheriff Jacobs was called upon for aid. The sheriff's deputies and an augmented police force finally dispersed the mob and arrested six of the leaders, warrants are out for 20 more.

The riot was caused by Father Walters having five of the eight trustees of the church arrested for forcibly obtaining possession of the keys and conspiring to put him out, they having objected to his appointment recently. The matter will be settled by the courts.

WILL BUILD CANNERY.

Clarkston, Washington, Preparing to Can Fruits of Inland Empire.

The Clarkston, Wash., Republican gives the following account of the projected fruit canning establishment at that place:

Clarkston is to have a cannery. The "Republican" has talked cannery to its readers for so long that they have become somewhat wearied, but it is a sure thing this time. White Bros. & Crum Co., Ltd., have purchased five lots on the present site of their fruit packing establishment and propose to put in a canning plant. They are at present negotiating for the purchase of the lot on the corner of Fifth and Sycamore street, and if they secure it they will put the plant on the corner. The building will be of brick and a substantial one and will contain a cold storage plant and also jelly works and a vinegar factory in connection. The cold storage plant will be used for the storing of eggs and fruit and any other perishable truck. All fruit will be taken into the packing establishment first and the choicest will be packed for shipment and the remainder will be canned or as much of it as is suitable and what is left will be put into the jelly works or the vinegar factory. In this way every bit of the fruit will be used and nothing wasted. Everything in the fruit and vegetable line that grows will be handled and the plant will probably be run throughout the entire year. The Palouse apples will be handled after the fruit here and the preparing of vinegar for the market will take some time and then during the winter they will can pork and beans and probably some fish. They have also ordered in this connection a large grading and dusting machine. This is now on the road and is expected daily. It will be a valuable addition as the fruit that is dusted and graded will bring a fancier price than that which is turned in dusty and not graded. This was tried last year and the dusting was done by hand but they had to dispense with it because it took too long and the packers were very erratic in their grading. The company is also figuring with outside parties for the construction of an ice plant which is to be run independently of the cannery but which will supply ice for the cold storage plant. This deal is about completed and an ice plant is assured in the near future.

George W. Ferguson, local manager for White Bros. Crum Co., when interviewed in regard to this, said: "Yes, the cannery will be built as soon as arrangements can be completed. The time has come when Clarkston is in absolute need of a cannery. The yield this year is about double that of last year and will be so for some years to come. Why, off three trees from a ranch near Alpowa the grower took 300 boxes of cherries or 3000 pounds which netted him 3 cents a pound and there was some waste. The trees are 25 years old. Imagine what this country will be in 15 years. With the present market and shipping facilities only the choicest fruit can be handled and the rest goes to waste, while if there was a cannery it could all be utilized and what is lost now would more than pay for the packing and shipping of good fruit. We have demonstrated this year, beyond a doubt, that the best way to ship fruit is through a company that makes a business of fruit and nothing else. The producer never makes a good shipper. We paid four and four and one-half cents for cherries this season

and those who shipped on their own hook or otherwise in many cases got less than a cent a pound. We did this by having a man out in the territory all the time and studying the markets. At one time this year fruit was sold in Chicago much less than it could be bought for here while last year at one time peaches brought five cents a box in Chicago. We kept all our fruit away from those flooded districts and realized something on it, while those who went it blind got the worst of it. It is the same with a cannery. If a number of growers mix up in it there will always be somebody unsatisfied and the management is changing all the time, while the corporation has to buy the fruit and take its chances. It has not yet been decided what will be paid for fruit or vegetables, but the company has always paid good prices and these will prevail in buying for the cannery. The fruit growers will be given suggestions at the proper time relative to the kind of vegetables which can be used to the best of advantage and for which there will be the greatest demand."

This cannery will mean much for Clarkston and Vineland and everybody is glad to see it go in and especially under such capable management. Let us hope that the other advantages that we have been predicting will follow and put Clarkston in its proper place among the cities of the Inland Empire.
