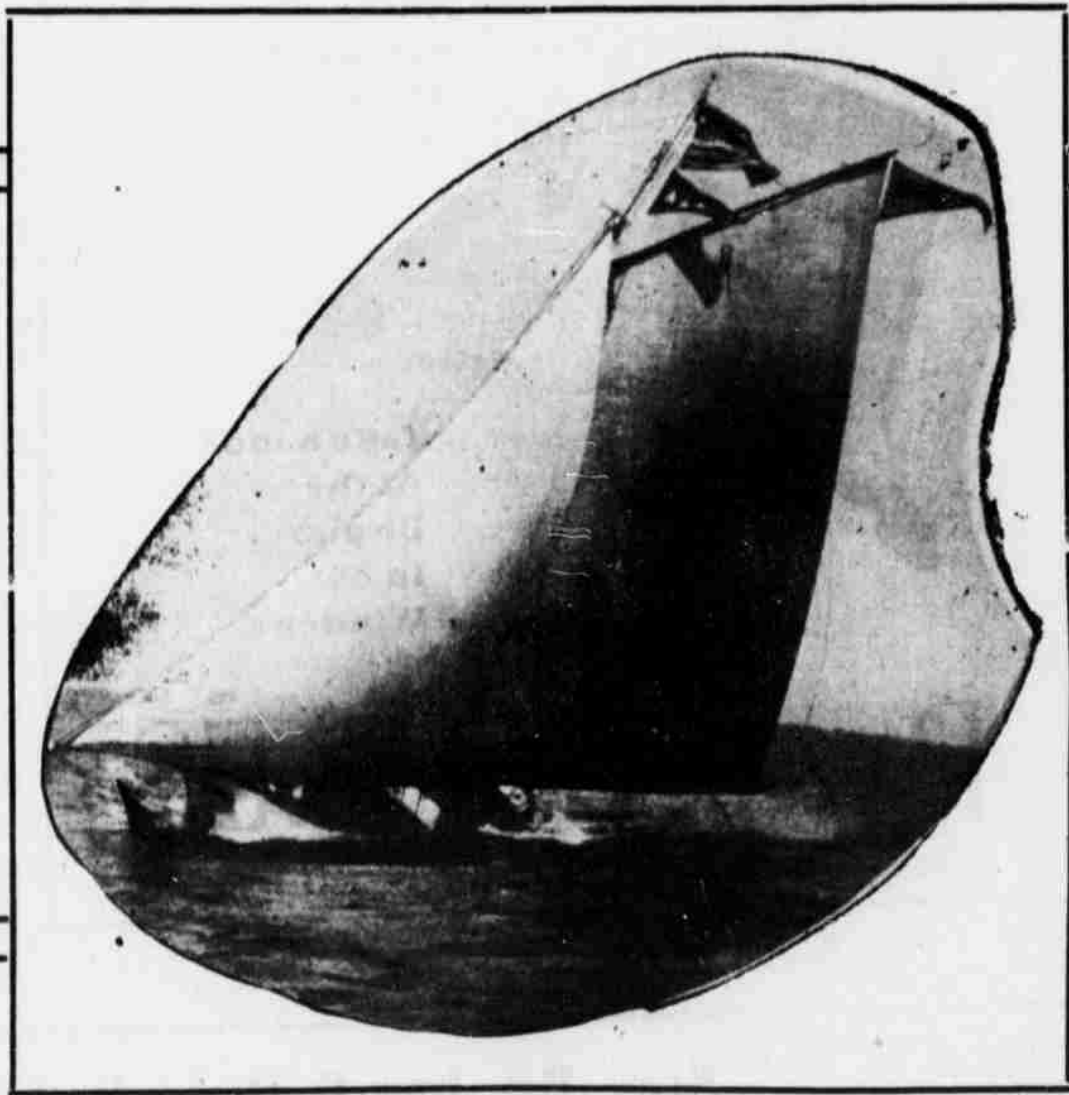

and Reckless Spendthrift
Ever Known to Stage.

WON AND SPENT \$10,000,000

Financially "Broke" Now, but
Coming to America Next Season
to Recoup as Far as
Possible in Final Tour.

Women of the world, there is one of you who is yet beautiful and virile, who has made \$10,000,000 by her own efforts and in her own right, but who has not a thousand dollars left.

How she made the money is known of all who care to inquire. How she spent it is another question. In one evening she won \$14,000 from the bank at Monte Carlo. How much she lost during a hundred other evenings is not recorded.

The splendid triumphs of her race-horses are a part of the turf history of two continents. The cost of her stables, her jockeys, trainers, and wagers is not so interesting. But it might help to account for a part of the \$10,000,000 that she made and lost.

Ten million dollars! It is a kindly fortune, and yet the woman who made and lost it, has yielded nothing of her courage, nothing of her hope. She has not even changed her mode of living. Today she is the most extravagant, the most liberal, the least worried woman of her age and race. She is bankrupt, but she is merry. She is getting old, but her spirit is untrifled. What did she do with \$10,000,000? What of value did she buy with it? How much was squandered? What is left to her of value? She has lost it all. Her fame reaches around the world. So far as the world knows she has her fame. But she is growing old and poverty is no longer a remote possibility.

Millions From Chunk of Ice.

Lily Langtry, the British beauty, the sum and flower of all they have sent us, is broke.

That means that she is financially decrepit. You know how old she is, don't you? Most people do. That is, they know how many years have passed since her birth. Most people know that she achieved fame by slipping a chunk of ice under the collar of Prince Albert Edward of Wales. The ice got down into the region of his diaphragm, and Lily, the Jersey wonder, the adventurous woman, became a celebrity. Albert Edward, who, was prince of Wales, is king now. But his accession hasn't helped the Langtry to a noticeable extent. She was a pretty woman a long time ago and the way she bit holes in the furniture and in the scenery convinced nearly everybody that she was a great actress. Now she is broke and means to return to America and get enough money out of the trip to justify her retirement.

Sale of Gems Indicates the End.

The sale of the Langtry gems, said to be the most valuable in all of Europe outside of the inherited baubles of royalty, has convinced the majority of Langtry's followers that the strangely beautiful adventuress has reached the "end of her string." There was never a critic and never a public that agreed to agree that Mrs. Langtry was a capable actress. In many ways she is the star adventuress of all history. Beautiful? Certainly, but that was all, unless audacity, a cunning knowledge of human nature, and a positive genius for choosing and "picking" weaklings can be counted in her favor.

Since the beginning of her public career she has made more than \$10,000,000. At best she is and has always been a mediocre actress. But she has made more money than Bernhardt, Duse, Marlowe, or anybody, so far as the figures can be verified.

In the matter of histrionic art the Langtry was the coarsest exemplar that Great Britain ever sent us. But she did make more money than any of her predecessors or rivals. In the course of her career she got, and, perhaps earned, over \$10,000,000. Now she is broke.

That Mrs. Lillian Langtry De Bath is to make one more desperate attempt to loosen a decent slice of the currency of the United States next season; that she is, in other words, to make a last stand, take a last chance, attempt a last coup, and offer herself as the most attractive bit on the theatrical bargain counter, is proved in the announcements concerning her new play.

Will Dramatize American Experiences
According to her present plans she is to appear in a dramatization of her early experiences in this country. The

piece is to be called "Talked About," and its central character is said to picture the life of a certain eccentric millionaire who dangled at the tail of her gowns to the sensational delight of press and public. This millionaire may and may not be Fred Gebhard, but Mrs. Langtry declares that no power on earth, as she looks upon the proposition now, can prevent her playing the play as written—not even the influence of the man who is most talked about in "Talked About."

Neither will she listen to the advice of her friends, who declare that the production of the play will revive the scandal of which the piece is a dramatization. But the Langtry declares that she has always done as she pleased, and that she is altogether too old to change her habits now.

Hence the Langtry's farewell tour is to be a dramatic exploitation of those adventures which made her early triumphs possible and easy. She figures that a scandalous dramatization of her experiences will "pay." The question of "pay" is the only one that interests her, since, to quote the vernacular, "she is all in." She was never an actress in the dignified, scholarly sense, but she brought to America the styles of the Bon Marche, the money of European nobles, and the prestige of having slipped a chunk of ice under the neckband of the British heir apparent.

Extravagance Her Manager's Despair.

What has the Jersey Lily done with the \$10,000,000 that she has won from the world during her public career? That is a question easy to answer, but not so easy to understand. In the first place Mrs. Langtry has been and is universally known as "the most generous woman in the profession." No man or woman of her company was ever permitted to suffer the experiences of poverty. The critics may say that she is a bad actress. Actors and actresses will say that she is the most generous, the most unselfish, the most cordial, noble spendthrift that the stage ever knew. She was the despair of thrifty managers and the delight of every man and woman fortunate enough to serve in her company.

Much of her \$10,000,000 went towards making her tours enjoyable, not for herself alone, but for each and every member, no matter how humble, of her company. Special trains, special hotel accommodations, the first and best of everything; no count of cost, no question of profits, no figuring with business agents.

That was always Lily Langtry's way. Her manager would come to her at night and say:

"The regular train leaves for Denver at 7 o'clock in the morning."
"That's too early," she would answer. "We will be awake at 10."

"But that means a special train. It will cost \$300."

"Three hundred fiddlesticks," the sumptuous Jersey beauty would reply. "Call it \$3000! Do you think I will make my company miserable for \$300? Have a special train for us by all means."

And so she spent the millions that she won.

Famous London House Sold.

Her best earnings have been in America. But London was her home and there her heart was set. The famous London house of Mrs. Langtry with the huge grizzly bear she carried home all the way from the Rocky

mountains standing upright in fierce attitude in the hall, and where she took her first step on the social toboggan by dropping a fragment of ice down the back of the then prince of Wales, has been sold at auction by "Messrs. Har-old, Limited, at the Mart," which, to the fashionable world, means that the Jersey Lily arranged to close up her affairs in swaggar style.

To her intimates Mrs. Langtry often has said she meant to live in this house until her death, and to be buried from there. The place, which is in Tedworth square, is associated with the most thrilling incidents in the life of the most brilliant and successful adventuress, probably, that this generation has known. Royalty has run riot there. The midnight suppers in the beautiful dining room, paneled and beamed with old oak gathered from all quarters of the globe, at one time were the wonder of two continents. The great open fireplace in this room was designed by Mrs. Langtry herself from one of Scott's descriptions in "Ivanhoe." The drawing rooms are paved with marble and hung with tapestries weaned by wealth from the poverty-stricken princely houses of Europe. The bathroom is lined with Florentine mosaic.

Money? From the time she first set foot in London, 30 odd years ago, until the present day Mrs. Langtry has never known the want of money. In everything she has undertaken she has been extravagantly personified.
