

JAPAN WILL LEAD CHINA

America and Great Britain Will Lead All Other Nations to a Condition of Higher Civilization.

Orion, Mich., Aug. 18.—In an address before the Michigan Baptist assembly. the Rev. R. S. McArthur has presented novel interpretation of the possible Japanese victory in the present crisis. as indicating an Anglo-Saxon world supremacy. In regard to the present

WORLD'S FAIR JURY CHOSEN

National Committee for the Louisiana Purchase Exposition Selects Judges of Awards.

WORK WILL TAKE 20 DAYS

More Than Two Hundred More or Less Prominent People Have Been Appointed Thus Far.

St. Louis, World's Fair Grounds, Aug. 18.-The work of naming and listing the members of the international jury of awards for the world's fair will be completed this week. More than 200 names of jurors who will comprise the majority of foreign jurors, were approved by the national committee.

The number of jurors accredited to each country making exhibits and which have been approved according to the rules and regulations governing the selection of jurors, which specifies that one juror may be selected for each 50 exhibits, are as follows:

The work of judging the exhibits will begin on September 1 and continue to September 20.
