BROTHER IS INDIGNANT

Postmaster of Crabtree Makes Sensational Charges Against Asylum Authorities.

PATIENT DIES OF NEGLECT

Alleged That Inmates of Asylum Have Not Proper Care-Governor Asked to Investigate.

The Eugene Register prints the following sensational arraignment of the state asylum authorities, made by W. I. Turnidge, whose brother died recently in the asylum:

Tortunes and abuse of helpless and sick inmates of the Oregon asylum for the insane are alleged by Postmaster W. J. Turnidge of Crabtree, Linn county, who openly alleged that inmates are 'left to beat themselves against walls and iron bedsteads, and to be ocked in a room to die alone, with no ore thought or compassion than is estowed on a horse or a dog."

-Postmuster Turnidge, who is a Crabtree merchant, has made formal complaint to Governor Chamberlain against he alleged abuses, which he says were called to his attention during the Illness and death of Joseph Turnidge, his prother, at the asylum during August He has also appealed to County Judge C. H. Stewart of Linn county, and with ears streaming from his eyes related to Judge Stewart a story of alleged abuse of the asylum inmates. The complaint to Judge Stewart was particularly directed at the treatment alleged to have been endured by Joseph

Posimaster Turnidge wrote Governor Chamberlain, asking him to investigate conditions at the asylum, shortly after the death of Joseph Turnidge. Hurried From Room.

"I started immediately, and found him unconscious and lying chilled with cold, nething on his body but a thin cotton shirt, and only one blanket spread over him. The doctors and attendants allowed me only a few moments in his room, then hurried me out and locked the door. I left then, but returned at 7:30 p. m., and found my brother conscious and perfectly ra-He begged me to take him When asked if he was cold, he said yes. His hands and feet were cold as clay. I told the doctor so, and asked for more cover, but he said it was unnecessary and would be in the way, and also said it was better not to talk to the patient, and insisted that I asked permission to do, as the rules of Change of Acts Thursdays. door was closed and locked.
