## ODD FELLOWS TO CONVENE

Grand Lodge Session Will Be Begun at San Francisco Commencing Monday.

CITY IS GAILY DECORATED

Feature of Encampment Will Be Full Military Encampment of 500 Patriarchs Militant

San Francisco, Sept. 17.—Preparations are practically completed for the reception and entertainment of the sovereign grand lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows which opens its sessions in this city next Monday. A committee of 100 citizens having the affair in charge are doing everything in their power to make the visit of the Odd Fellows as pleasant as possible. A feature of the convention will be a full military encampment of 500 patriarchs militant at the Mechanics' pavilion, where all requisite arrangements of cots, tents and other camp equipment have been made for the reception of the delegates.

A number of entertainments have been planned for the entertainment of the visitors and among them will be a grand concert and a full dress ball on the closing night of the convention. A committee left this city today to meet the officers of the sovereign grand lodge and escort them to this city, where they are expected to arrive tonight. The city is gaily decorated for the approaching convention and street illuminations will take place nightly during the convention week.

### LAUD THE PRESIDENT.

Bankers Have Full Confidence in His Integrity of Purpose.

New York, Sept. 17.—Frank B. Schenck, president of the Mercantile National bank, Manhattan, in an interview today said:

"I have full confidence in Mr. Roosevelt's integrity of purpose and determination to do what is patriotic and wise. His selection of advisers in the cabinet has indicated his determination to conduct the affairs of the government on the highest plane. The selection of his secretaries of the treasury has been wise and the banking community will have no need to fear any unsound monetary conditions from Mr. Roosevelt's administration. On the other hand, while the democratic candidate appears to be an estimable gentleman, I fear the men who would come into power with him."

William L. Moyer, president of the Shoe and Leather National bank, Manhattan, asserts that the reported hostile feeling in Wall street against President Roosevelt is very much overdrawn. He says:

"While some financiers may not favor President Roosevelt personally, I believe they will vote for him because of the principle he represents. On the other hand, many financiers admire President Roosevelt for the earnest, honest American that he is. They think that it was one of the best acts of the administration to curb the tendency to form great combinations. President Roosevelt's return to office would mean the settlement of the money question. Judge Parker's telegram does not change the attitude of the democratic party, for it was the individual act of a man."

### PEDDLERS AGAINST IT.

Say Half Dollar a Day for Push Carts Is Too Much.

New York, Sept. 17.—Trouble is again brewing among the push cart peddlers of the east side who claim that they are being victimized by a recently formal combination of stablemen. The latter term is applied to owners of push carts who rent them out at a fixed daily rate and maintain, underneath tenement houses, storage places for the carts where they are kept at night.

Sixty-seven stablemen, each owning from 200 to 350 carts, have organized and according to the peddlers, have advanced rates from 10 to 20 cents a day. The peddlers declare they could make little profit at the old rate and as they have no place to keep carts, are still compelled to pay the higher rates or quit. They are planning to ask the city authorities for a public place where they may maintain stables of their own.

### PAINT POT IS DANGEROUS.

Turpentine Takes Fire With Probably Fatal Results.

New York, Sept. 17.—Showered with blazing paint a man, a woman and a baby in a tenement house in East Twelfth street have received burns that will probably prove fatal. They were Isaac Schuster, a painter, Mrs. Lena Marks and her 12 months old child. Schuster accidentally dropped a blazing match into a bucket of paint. Flames shot upward from the turpentine and Schuster started on a run for the stairs with the bucket. A gust of wind blew the flames into his face, causing him to pitch headlong down the steps. Mrs. Marks, with her baby in her arms, was coming up. The sawcer of fire fell over them and all were badly burned.
