PLIGHT OF MILLIONAIRE.

Mistaken for Pauper He Is Confined in New York Hospital.

New York, Sept. 28.-While his friends and relatives were searching the city for him John H. Onderdonk, nephew of former Judge Onderdonk, and whose wealth is estimated at \$1,000,000, was an inmate of the Metropolitan hospital, on Biackwell's island, where he was looked upon as a derelici of the streets for four days.

It was only by accident that he was ound there by his physician, Dr. M. B. Feeney, of No. 30 Seventh street. Dr. Feeney had been treating another patient in the hospital and Mr. Onderdonk heard this person mention the physician's name.

He then prevailed upon one of the employes of the institution to call the doctor by telephone and inform him of his own plight.

Mr. Onderdonk is a sufferer from locomotor ataxia, which induces fits of vertigo. He left the home of Mrs. M. B. Dresner, with whom he boarded, at No. 50 West Twelfth street, on Saturday morning and boarded a north-

bound Sixth avenue car. At Sixtieth street he left the car and was almost immediately attacked by his allment. Sinking to a doorstep he was found there by a policeman, who took him to the Presbyterian hospital, where his case was diagnosed as one

As Mr. Onderdonk, who in earlier life was conspicuous for his fashionable appearance, has of late years worn old and shabby clothing, there was no suspicion that he was a man of means.

One feature of locomotor ataxia is that it prevents the victim from forming his thoughts into words, and Mr. Onderdonk was unable to explain his situation until the incident of the other patient railied his mind and he was able to get word to Dr. Feeney.

Purchasing Power of \$2.50 in 1401. Westminster Gazette: The wonderful change that has taken place in the

purchasing power of money is illustrated by a case cited in an article on the Manor of Great Waltham in the Essex Review for July:

"July, 1401-John Parker, sr., surrendered to his son John and said son's ter-virgate of copyhold, conditionally, that they shall keep John (senior) in food and clothes (both linen and wool) well and sufficiently for the rest of his life, or else, at John's (senior) option, pay him 10 shillings a year."
