I chalem Farmer Points Out Why Country South of Astoria Has Not Been Settled by Ranchers.

"If more Astoria business men would ome out to our country occasionally. well known Nebalem valley rancher yesterday, "you would know more about the principal farming district which is tributary to Astoria, and you would be more enthusiastic in of the county. For the want of good roads we every year feed large quantities of vegetables and fruits of all kinds to the hogs because we cannot get them to market. The farmers do not even cut all of their fine timothy hay, a market to make is very valuable. Unless we farmers can bring a little produce to town to sell we can not afford the expense of the trip very often.

"The county saw mill was taken to Road Supervisor J. Jamieson's place last week and will cut planking during the winter for the 18 miles of road between Olney and Jewell, and we hope in another year to have a road over which a team can haul a few sacks of spuds or a few bales of hay.

"We expect to petition the county court this fall for another two-mill levy for the benefit of this road fund. "Our part of the county needs roads more than anything else and the farmers are rallying to the battle cry more than ever before. Let the town people take steps to encourage road-building, for it is as much to the interest of Astoria as to that of the country. Give us good roads and we will supply you WM. GLAZED BUTTER.

Attractive Method of Protecting From Deterioration.

United States Consul General Richard Guenther, Frankfort, Germany, writes:

German papers state that it has long been known in Germany that butter can be glazed by the use of sugar; that is, it can be coated with a glass-like sugar covering. This method, the papers state, seems to become of some importance, as it recently has been used on a large scale in England for butter sold in forms.

The Druggists' Journal calls attention to the usefulness of this innoed and washed, then put into forms weighing one pound each and placed in a cool room.
