WILL BUILD MONASTERY

Rev. Henry Pelletan Buys Land Near Jordan for Trappist Fathers.

PRESBYTERIANS TO MEET

Stabbing Affray at Dance Near Waterloo, Linn County-Portland Druggist Buncoed—Other State News.

Albany, Ore., Oct. 11.—Rev. Henry Pelletan has purchased from the estate of the late John Bryant, 185 acres of land located near Jordan.

This is a fine tract of farming land and was purchased by Father Pelletan for a new home of the Trappist Fathers, who, expelled from France have come to this country to found a new home for themselves and others of their persecuted brethren who are compelled to leave France. They will build a monastery and probably a college similar to the Mount Angel institution, and here, in the land of religious liberty, found a home for their order that was denied them in France, the land of their birth. This purchase will be followed by further acquisitions of property as it is required for the colony and a flourishing community will soon mark the place where the Fathers settle.

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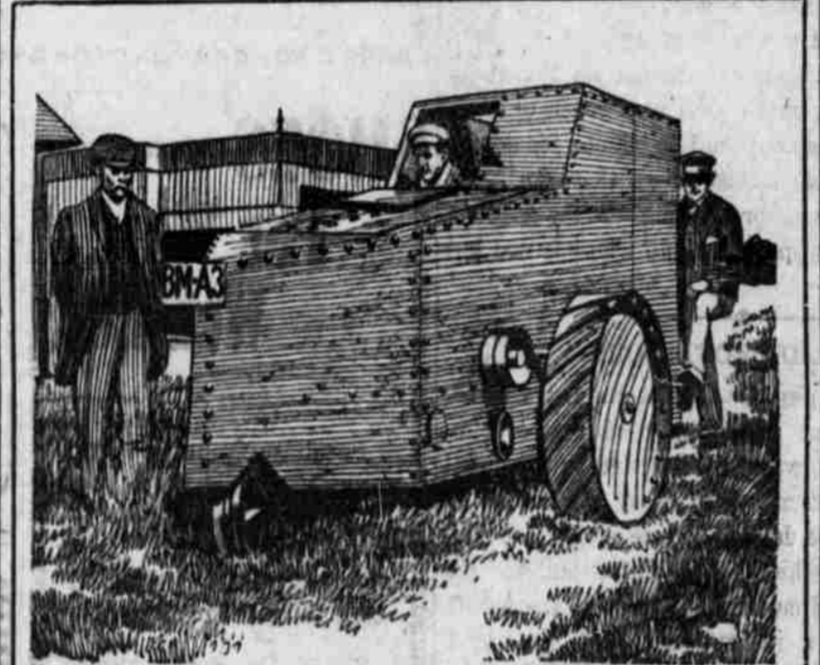
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ARMORED MOTOR AMBULANCE CAR.

Filling Guild Lake.

Portland, Oct. 11.—Guild's lake is being filled with water with a view to determining how great a depth may be obtained. Two centrifugal pumps, having a combined capacity of 24,000,000 gallons a day, were put into commission yesterday morning on a scow in the Willamette. These pumps will be used until a depth of four feet has been obtained.

This test is necessary in order to decide what work must be done in getting the lake into shape for navigation. Canoe connections are to be established during the fair between the main land and the peninsula, where the government exhibit is to be located. It is estimated that four feet of water will be required for this purpose. The ordinary depth of the water is about two feet.

The canoes are to be a distinctive feature in themselves. They are to be primitive craft such as were used by the Indian tribes of the Oregon country in the days of Lewis and Clark's arrival here. An Indian from each of the tribes with which Lewis and Clark came in contact in their explorations will be selected to paddle the canoes.

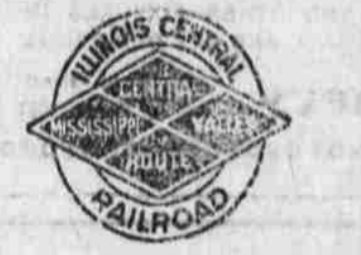
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
