## UNTIL DEATH DOETH PART

Illinois Conference of Methodist Church Goes on Record on Divorce Question.

### COMMITTEE MAKES REPORT

Report Stamps Divorce as Species of Selfishness and Condemns "Free Lover" Who Seeks Divorce to Remarry.

Chicago, Oct. 12.—After prolonged discussions lasting nearly a week the report of the committee on marriage and divorce was presented at the last moment at the closing session of the sixty-fourth Rock River conference the Methodist Episcopal church at the Evanston avenue church last night.

The report recommended a long courtship—long enough to test the quality of love. The importance of the permanence of the marriage tie was emphasized as having a direct bearing on human development. The committee was unanimous in maintaining that a marriage was contracted "until death doeth part."

The bond was declared to be indissoluble and never to be entered into irreverently or unadvisedly.

The principal contention that divided the committee was upon the question of recognizing as a candidate for second marriage the innocent party to a divorce decree. The decision was a compromise. A resolution was adopted for the purpose of prohibiting the remarriage of the guilty matrimonial party to a divorce decree during the lifetime of the innocent party.

Stamping divorce as a species of selfishness the report condemned the "free lover" who "ninety nine times out of a hundred seeks divorce that he may have more marriage."

The proper conception of matrimony was declared to be the basis of pure and anticipatory life, as well as the best detriment from evil.

The conference voted to join with other churches in an attempt to secure the enactment of uniform divorce laws in every state.

### MCCARTER OWNED THE AUTO.

Chauffeur Stole It Out For A Lark With Fatal Results.

New York, Oct. 12.—Mystery surrounding the ownership of the automobile that plunged down Jerome avenue to the New York Central tracks last Friday morning, killing three and maiming four others has been cleared up by the coroner's inquest.

Thomas H. McCarter, president of the Public Service Corporation of New Jersey, owned the automobile. Albert Noyes, the driver who was almost instantly killed under the wreckage of the machine, was in his employ. He had been instructed to take it to a repair shop Thursday night after carrying the owner to his home in Newark. Evidently Noyes took advantage of his instructions to spend the evening with friends.

The coroner's jury found Noyes to blame for the wreck, but recommended the closing of the blind street where the automobile ran over a wall and fell to the railroad tracks.

### ARCTIC DOING WELL.

Word Received from Major Moodie's Party.

Hallfax, N. S. Oct. 12.—A dispatch from A. P. Low, of the Canadian Hudson Bay Expedition has been received by the marine department announcing that the steamer Arctic with Major Moodie's party on board, reached Port Burwell Oct. 1st. At that point, which is near the entrance to Hudson straits, the Arctic rendezvoused with the steamer Neptune, which has been in Hudson bay since 1903 and which has passed Chateau bay, in the Strait of Belle Isle from which place Low's

### ONCE FOUGHT EACH OTHER.

Ex-American Soldier and Ex-Filipino Soldier Now Schoolmates.

Chicago, Oct. 12.—That two students of the University of Chicago at present working together in amity, were formerly pitted against each other in battle in the discovery made by John B. Kenne, formerly an American soldier, and Frederico Sarabia, a native Filipino, both of whom are working their way through college.

In the early part of 1899 Kenne was a member of "Young's scouts." Sarabia at the same time was a sergeant in the first Manila regulars, a regiment which formed part of the first division—Aguinaldo's own—under command of the Filipino General Pilar.

The forces of which the men were members met in conflict in the battles of Manila, San Isidro and Tarbou Bridge, in each of which the Manila regulars were defeated.

### PAID DREYFUS WITNESSES.

Alleged That Accounts Were Tampered With to Conceal Facts.

Paris, Oct. 12.—A Nationalist newspaper organ asserts that the committal for trial by court martial on September 25 of D'Autriche and other officers accused of falsifying the secret service accounts was not the work of the minister of war, General Dessirer, governor of Paris, who seeks to give the men opportunity to clear themselves publicly despite the conclusions of the investigating officers, that their offenses were covered by the decree of amnesty in the Dreyfus case. The whole interest in the case turns upon the allegation that tampering with accounts was done with the object of concealing the fact that payments were made to witnesses in the trial of Captain Dreyfus at Rennes.
