## FARMERS ARE NOW AROUSED

Organize With View to Mutual Protection of Their Property Against Hunters.

### TO LICENSE MEAT PEDDLERS

Eugene Citizens Would Have Inherent Salesman Pay—Unitarians to Meet at Salem - Other State News.

Aumsville, Ore., Oct. 13.—Aumsville hunters are not at all partial to the hunters of this country. This fact they have shown by the recent organization of a company or association that they have given the name "The Aumsville Buzz Saw Association." The resolutions adopted by the association declare its object to be mutual protection of its members from trespassing of hunters.

The members agree to do all in their power to prevent illegal hunting, and promise to prosecute all trespassers.

### Property Values Higher.

Salem, Ore., Oct. 13.—The work of footing up the big assessment rolls of Marion county for the year 1904 was completed by County Clerk J. W. Roland yesterday. The figures of the new roll show a net valuation of all taxable property in Marion county of \$19,373,830, as against \$9,398,378 for the year 1903, a portion of the difference, however, being due to the fact that in 1903 there was allowed \$649,227 in exemptions. The gross value of the property as given on last year's roll was \$10,047,605, or \$326,225 less than the total valuation of this year's roll.

### Getting Ready For Mill.

Eugene, Ore. Oct. 13.—There is great activity at the Badger mine in Blue River district. A force of men is driving a new tunnel opening a still better and richer ledge. Splendid ore is being piled onto the dump ready for the mill which is now at Blue River City, and which will be put in place next spring. The Badger property ranks with the best in the district, and gives promise of being a great wealth producer.

### Too Much Patent Medicine.

Roseburg, Oct. 13.—Patent medicine containing alcohol proved the mental undoing of Geo. Davis, a resident of Comstock, who was taken to the asylum from here, pursuant to an order of commitment made by the county court. Davis is 53 years of age. His insanity developed only a week ago, when he became delirious from the patent medicine he was taking and began wandering aimlessly about. He was found scantily clad on the railway track by neighbors, who later brought him to Roseburg for examination. Davis is a single man. He has a brother who resides in Tacoma.

Salem, Ore. Oct. 13.—The third annual session of the North Pacific Unitarian conference will be held in Salem, Oregon, beginning Tuesday evening and closing Thursday evening, October 27.

### WOULD ADVERTISE SALMON.

President Fortmann, of Alaska Packers, Points Out the Need.

That canned salmon has been insufficiently advertised is the opinion of the leading packers on the coast. Henry Fortmann, president of the Alaska Packers' Association, is one of the men who believe that advertising will help the industry, and he has suggested a plan that progressive packers will probably be anxious to adopt. In an interview with a representative of the Pacific Fisherman, Mr. Fortmann said of the matter:

"The readers of the Pacific Fisherman understand that the total consumption of canned salmon in the United States has never been more than 2,000,000 cases. There are 48 pounds to the case, and by referring to the statistics we see that the total production on the Pacific coast in the four years from 1900 to 1903, inclusive, was 16,000,000 cases. About 4,000,000 cases were sent to Japan and other uncommon (not regular) markets. Europe consumed 1,125,000 cases last year. Therefore, in these four years about one-half of the amount of our product has been disposed of in foreign markets, leaving 8,000,000 cases, or 2,000,000 cases a year, for the United States, making 96,000,000 pounds, which shows that the people of this country are consuming but little more than one pound of salmon per capita per annum.

"Here is the opening for a great educational campaign. The Alaska Packers' association would be in favor of a plan whereby all the packers of the coast would join in contributing to a fund for advertising purposes. This could be accomplished most equitably by levying an assessment of so much per case, the expense thus being borne proportionately by the packers according to the amount of their pack."

### WILL CARRY LARGE INSURANCE.

Chicago Woman Takes Policies for \$500,000.

Chicago, Oct. 13.—Mrs. Charles Netcher, owner of a downtown department store, is following in the footsteps of her late husband. When he decided to build on his property he insured his life for \$500,000 so that in the event of his death his plans might not be interfered with.

Mrs. Netcher having taken up the burden, dropped by her husband on June 20, when he died, has decided to do likewise. Four large insurance companies in the east have agreed to issue a \$500,000 policy on her life. One company will take \$200,000 of the risk and the three others \$100,000 each.
