SINGULAR SUIT FOR DAMAGES.

Young Woman's Face Used to Advertise Make of Corsets.

Chicago, Oct. 28.—Miss Cora Ward, of Joliet, is willing to offer her beauty on the shrine of commercial art, but she draws the line at displaying her handsome features to make a line of underwear aluring.

Miss Ward has a striking face and was induced to pose for a photographer, knowing her picture was to be used for advertising. She says she sat for a bust picture and expected her figure would be displayed only in that way. She was astounded when she learned that a mail order catalogue contained her likeness on a form showing styles of underwear.

She declared on the witness stand that she would not sanction the use of her picture posed in any form in which she would not have exhibited herself.

According to her testimony, it appears that one day a friend of Miss Ward discovered the annual catalogue of the mail order house for 1901-1902 and saw therein two postures advertising certain brands of underwear with the face of Miss Ward upon the shoulders of the advertising figures. Then her friends began to speculate if she had actually posed in the attitudes given in the pictures. The young woman asserted the matter injured her character. She contends that the fact that she had sold her face, figuratively speaking, for advertising purposes did not give the mail order firm the right to place it upon any dummy pose they might choose, and she considers the advertisements immodest and libelous, because they give the impression that she posed in the attitudes given.

The defendant corporation will have to explain why it used the head of Miss Ward in the poses displayed, if it is proved that it is the likeness of the plaintiff, and then the jury will have to decide if Miss Ward was damaged by the appearance of her face in the advertisement. All this will be done today.

AGAINST GUESSING.

Business Men of Cincinnati Petition President to Stop Contests.

Nearly 100 of the representative business and professional men of Cincinnati have forwarded to President Roosevelt a protest against newspaper guessing contests, especially on the election. Here are extracts from the protest or petition:

"Being unalterably of the opinion that the schemes complained of herein stimulate the spirit of gambling, encourage breaches of trust, create profligacy and mendacity and that they are as detrimental to public morality as any lottery ever devised, and being firmly of the opinion that they are in contravention of the United States statutes against lotteries and schemes for the distribution of money by chance, we respectfully petition you to cause such steps to be taken by the department of justice and by the postoffice department as may be proper and necessary to suppress

the schemes of chance now being promoted through the use of the United States mails.

"We therefore respectfully petition that such an order be issued and further call attention to the fact that prompt action on the part of the government will insure to the benefit not only of the participants in these illegal schemes and to the general public, but to the promoters thereof as well."

WANTS EQUALITY.

Michigan Equal Suffrage People in Convention.

Jackson, Mich., Oct. 28.—Acting upon advice given in a letter of greeting from Susan B. Anthony, the Michigan Equal Association convention in annual session here, adopted a resolution demanding that the word "male" be eliminated from section 8 of the state constitution. The section referred to is the one bearing upon elections and specifying what requirements must be met to entitle "male" inhabitants to vote at elections. The letter from Miss Anthony was received with enthusiasm. It said:

"To get that word out of the clause will settle the question of woman's equality for all time. Let the Federation of Women's Clubs and other women's organizations ask for the tidbits of suffrage if they like, but do you ask for the whole loaf every time."
