**SEVEN MEN TO
CHOOSE FROM**

No Dearth of Candidates for Pres-
idency of the United States
This Fall.

NEGROES DID NOT NOMINATE

Held Two Conventions, but Got
No Farther—Thirty New Sen-
ators to Be Elected Dur-
ing Year.

New York, Oct. 31.—Nine na-
tional political conventions were held
this year, and nine candidates for
president and vice president of the
United States were nominated, but
only six electoral tickets will be gen-
erally voted for one week from to-
morrow. Besides "the two great po-
litical parties," seven others made
nominations—people's, prohibition, so-
cialist, socialist-labor, continental (la-
bor), national liberty (negro) and
Lincoln (negro).

The two negro parties, however, ap-
parently ended their work when the na-
tional conventions adjourned, as no
electors have been selected, or at
least, none will appear on any official
ballot; and the continental party seems
to be confined to Illinois, and, perhaps
to Chicago, the place of its origin.

The terms of 39 United States sena-
tors expire March 4 next. Seven of
the vacancies have already been filled,
and the legislatures of 23 states to be
elected November 5 will fill the other
23. Members of the house of repre-
sentatives are to be voted for in all
except three states—Maine, Vermont
and Oregon, which have already elected
their congressmen.

In 27 states a governor and all or
nearly all the executive state officers
are to be chosen; in five states, minor
state officers are to be selected, and,
in 13, electors are to be voted for.

South Carolina enjoys the distinc-
tion of having only one ticket in the
field. All the other states have from
four to six, Illinois leading with seven.
There are three republican tickets in
Delaware, but the only variation is
in the names of the candidates, the
nominee for governor of the regulars
refusing to abide by the decision of
the factional conference, which re-
sulted in the withdrawal of the "un-
ion" candidate and an agreement upon
a compromise ticket. The republi-
cans in Wisconsin will have a choice
between two tickets for state officers,
the "stalwarts" having decided to keep
up their fight against La Follette.
The electors on both tickets, how-
ever, are identical.

The democrats and people's party,
or populists, fused on the state ticket
in Kansas and Nebraska, but in both
states the people's party named sepa-
rate presidential electors. In Nevada,
the democrats and one wing of the
silver party divided the minor state
officers to be voted for, but the "stal-
wart silver" men put up their own
electors.

The people's party, which endorsed
Mr. Bryan in 1896 and 1900, has an ac-

states, the nominees for state officers
live organization in 32 of the 45
and electors being on the official bal-
lots in 12 states and for electors in 20.
Efforts to this end were made in a
number of other states, but the re-
quisite number of signatures to pe-
titions were not obtained.

The prohibitionists have electoral
state tickets in 27 states and electoral
tickets in 12 others—one less than in
1900.

The socialists (called in some states
social-democrats) have electoral and
state tickets in 32 states, and electoral
tickets in 11 others—seven more than
in 1900.

The socialist-labor party has whole
or part electoral and state tickets in
12 states and electoral tickets in two
others—six less than in 1900.

COULD NOT KEEP SILENT.

To Save Miss Patterson Two Men
Confess Knowledge of Death.

New York, Oct. 31.—Interest has
been revived in the case of Nan Pat-
terson, the actress who has been in
prison several months awaiting trial
on charges of fatally shooting "Cae-
sar" Young a well known turfman.
Two mysterious persons, asserted to
be among the first citizens of the com-
munities in which they reside are re-
ported to have come forward, accord-
ing to the press, with written state-
ments that they saw Young kill him-
self while riding in a cab with the
actress on his way to a pier where his
wife was awaiting his arrival to be-
gin a voyage to Europe. The genui-
neness of the story is now under in-
vestigation.

Quite as remarkable as the tragic
end of Young is the story now pub-
lished. Hardly had Young drawn his
last breath than one of the two
witnesses is asserted to have sworn
the other to secrecy and himself took
a vow what he had seen never would
be told. This was done by the men.
It is said, because they did not want it
known that they were in New York at
the time. Both men returned to
their homes the same day.

At first the pledge was easy to
keep but when Miss Patterson was
indicted, conscience began to press on
the mind of one of the men that
there was a duty to the young woman
that rose in importance far above con-
sideration of self.

As the weeks of her detention
lengthened into months, the demands
of conscience became a torture and in
doubt as to the best way in which to
make known their story, one of the
men wrote to a person of repute in
New York for advice. In this com-
munication the statement is un-
equivocal that Young took his own
life.

SHOT WITH AMMONIA.

Tragic End of Policeman's Long
Chase for Scorchers.

New York, Oct. 31.—Automobilists
who violate the law have discovered
a sure means for escaping minions of
the law who pursue them. Ammonia,
thrown by some sort of a syringe, is
the safeguard. At least its use has
been demonstrated in a thrilling
chase by a Fifth avenue policeman
mounted on a bicycle.

The officer has arrested scores of
automobilists and has become some-
what of a terror to those exceeding
the speed limit. As he was pedaling
up Fifth avenue, watching the endless
stream of carriages and motor cars,
a big touring machine dashed past
with two men and two women. He
called upon the chauffeur to slow
down but a derisive laugh was the
only answer, and the policeman took
after the party. He did his best from
18th street to 40th street and had just
reached the back of the machine
when a puff of vapor shot into his
face and he stumbled headlong from
his wheel. The automobile party had
disappeared when the officer regained
his breath and trundled his broken
bicycle to the station house.

A RECORD RUN.

B. & O. Train Makes 131 Miles in
126 Minutes.

Chicago, Oct. 31.—A dispatch to the
Tribune from Farrell, Ind., says:
A special train carrying President
Oscar G. Murray of the Baltimore &
Ohio Railway company and party has
made a record run over the Chicago
division, covering 131 miles in 126
minutes. The train was drawn by a
locomotive of the Atlantic type.

FILIPINOS MAKE PRESENTS.

President and Family Recipients of
Interesting Articles.

St. Louis, Oct. 31.—Several exhibi-
tioners have expressed a desire to the
committee in charge of the distribu-
tion and return of the exhibits in the
Philippine reservation to the island
that their displays, which have
been greatly admired by world's fair
visitors, be presented to President
Roosevelt. Mrs. Roosevelt, Miss Alice
Roosevelt and Secretary of War Taft.
The presents to President Roosevelt
will include photographs of the islands,
bamboo baskets and a bamboo hat,
a handsome stationery case of fine native
woods, and a hand-made curtain of
pineapple fibre.

The gift to Mrs. Roosevelt consists
of a set of handsome embroidered
handkerchiefs, while some of the hand-
somest and rarest of the displays in
the liberal arts department, exhibi-
ted by Filipino women, will be pre-
sented to Miss Alice Roosevelt.

POTTERY WORKERS DISAGREE.

May Cause Shut-down, Throwing Out
2500 Employees.

Renton, N. Y., Oct. 31.—Anxiety is
felt in this city over the outcome of
the attempt which will be made to en-
force the uniform wage scale in the
potteries next Tuesday. About 2500
men are involved.

The figger men declare that they
will not begin work under the new
scale while the kiln men, sagger-
makers and representatives of other
branches of the industry insist that
the scale must go into effect or they
will quit. The manufacturers are
helpless because of this division of
opinion among the brotherhood men
and a compulsory shut down of all the
potteries is expected.

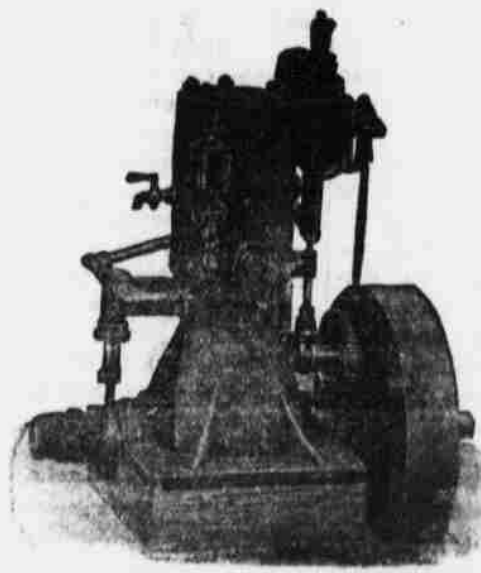
