

MAJORITY IS RECORD ONE

Twenty-two of Twenty-six Clatsop County Precincts Return Immense Roosevelt Vote.

APATHY HAS BEEN GENERAL

Republican Candidate's Lead Is 1035 and Will Be Increased to 1075 When All Returns Are In.

With the four small precincts of Elsie, Jewell, Mishawaka and Push to be heard from, Clatsop county has given Roosevelt a plurality of 1035 votes, the greatest in the history of the county. In 1896 McKinley's plurality was 714; in 1900 it was 633. The apathy of the Bryan democrats was general throughout the county, and the vote has fallen far short of the registration. The following statement shows the vote for Roosevelt and Parker in the 22 precincts thus far heard from.

The vote for Debs, socialist, was almost as great as that for Parker. The vote for Debs and for Swallow, the latter the prohibition candidate, was as follows:

The vote for Watson was as follows: Astoria No. 1, 1; Astoria No. 2, 1; Astoria No. 5, 1; Astoria No. 7, 2; New Astoria, 4; total, 10.
Revised returns of an unofficial nature show that Roosevelt received 862 votes in the city, while Parker received but 212. Roosevelt's plurality being

550. In the city Debs received 161, Swallow received 25, and Watson 5. Roosevelt's majority in the city is 459.
In one outside precinct, Vesper, Parker received no votes, the 14 votes of that place being cast for Roosevelt. Olney, democratic in past years, gave Roosevelt a plurality of 23 out of 40 votes, and the republican electors carried every precinct in the county. It is estimated that the four missing precincts will bring up the republican plurality to 1075.

SUES EMPLOYERS FOR \$250,000.

Declares Lockout A Violation of Arbitration Contract.

New York, Nov. 9.—A summons has been served on Charles L. Eidlitz, as president of the Building Trades' Employers' Association, in an action begun in the supreme court by George Klinton, to recover \$250,000 for damages alleged to have been incurred through the lockouts in the trade. Charles M. Beattie represents the brotherhood.
The complaint recites the make-up of the brotherhood and admits that one of the means of increasing wages, reducing hours of work and preventing the employment of non-union men is to strike, "to-wit, for the members of the body or bodies peacefully to abstain from work until their demands are justified."

The complaint recites the execution of the arbitration agreement by which an arbitration board was organized and the unions agreed not to strike, while the members of the Building Trades Employers' Association agreed not to lockout their employes until disputes had been brought before the board.

The complaint then states that on or about August 8, 1904, while the agreement was in force, the employers' association locked out all the members of the brotherhood.

POLWORTH IS SUCCESSFUL

The Mighty Bruce Seems to Have Outguessed His Friend, the Genial Michael.

FOUR PRECINCTS REPORTED

Polworth Has Lead of 64, Which Is Expected to Be Increased to 75—Megler Is Re-elected.

The Hon. J. Bruce Polworth, of the precinct of Cathlamet, in the county of Wahklakum, state of Washington, has, according to reports from the aforesaid precinct, been elected attorney of the county above-named. The Hon. J. Bruce Polworth is a democrat of the old school, but, as there were no republican attorneys in the county, he was selected as the nominee of the G. O. P. in opposition to J. C. McFadden, the particular friend of the Hon. Michael Gorman, democratic leader.

Over in Wahklakum county the people voted for presidential, state and county candidates. The governorship fight was warm, and the presidential contest aroused great interest, but the people were particularly anxious about the attorneyship. It was a personal matter. Mr. Polworth bolted Mr. Gorman's domination of the democracy and went into the camp of the enemy. He retained the privilege of voting for democratic candidates for state offices and also the privilege of voting for Judge Parker, but locally he was for his erstwhile friend Michael. Now, Michael was sure he would defeat Bruce, while Bruce was just as sure he wouldn't.

Bruce was right and Michael was wrong, for returns from Cathlamet received last night indicate the election of Mr. Polworth by a majority of 75. The precincts come from the four principal precincts in the county, while four precincts are to be heard from. The precincts which are reported by S. G. Williams, secretary of the county republican committee, are Cathlamet, Puget Island, Skamokawa and Brookfield. These places give Mr. Polworth 64 majority over Mr. McFadden, and it is expected that the missing precincts will increase the lead to 75.

The four precincts reporting give Roosevelt 319 and Parker 87. The vote for gubernatorial candidates is: Mead, 294; Turner, 212. The republican candidates for congress received the following vote: Humphrey, 291; Jones, 290; Cushman, 292. The democratic candidates for congress received the following vote: Hathaway, 94; Anderson, 95; Beck, 94.
Judge Rice has probably carried the county by 276 over Elliott, democrat.

This was the principal fight in Pacific, where Jack Wilson, roadmaster, was the storm center of the contest. It is evident that the people have turned down Wilson. Otherwise the republican candidates have been successful.
