

LUMBERING IN OREGON

Business Not Rushing at Present ---Camps May Shut Down Next Month.

NOTES FROM MILL AND CAMP

Good Demand for First Grades—Prices About Stationary—New Plants Are Going Up—Prospects Are Good.

The logging business is quiet and there is a general understanding that about the first of December many of the camps along the Columbia river will close down for some time. A few may remain closed over the holidays while others perhaps will lie idle for a couple of weeks only. Prices on first class yellow fir are quoted at \$7 per M., and other grades in accordance. The weather has been all that could be desired and not in the least have operations been hampered on that score. In fact so pleasant has been the weather over the whole state during the past month that the natives have begun to wonder what is the matter with old Jupiter.

The lumber trade has been up to expectations for this part of the season and local mills have no particular complaints to make in that line. Prices have remained unchanged since the 15th of last month when there was a small reduction on rough lumber. Building operations have continued brisk as a result of the unusually fine weather and this of course has aided local trade. Coast shipments by water are keeping up at a lively lick. There appears to be a better demand in the east for first grade lumber at the expense of lower grades. This, if anything, may have a tendency to cause an increase in prices on first grade logs and it would not be at all surprising to see loggers hold out for \$7.50 for yellow fir.

The Oregon & Washington Lumber Company is still busy getting its plant in south Portland ready for operations and it is now understood that by the first of the year the new plant will be among the producers. Adjoining this plant the Multnomah Box & Trunk Company is erecting a large plant to take the place of the plant destroyed in that vicinity by fire several weeks ago. With these two plants in operation, the south end will again be lively.

Report comes from Alsea to the effect that Charles L. Diven and E. Young are about to establish a shingle mill there. The enterprise is certain to receive support and encouragement and will no doubt succeed if there is any field at all for operations, which is likely, the country being gradually developed and growing. In this connection it might not be amiss to state that people are flocking into Oregon at a rapid rate and in consequence thereof not only the large communities but also the smaller towns are rapidly gaining in population. Dwellings in many parts of the state are in great demand and building operations are going on at a rate that means business for the lumber manufacturers.

In touching briefly upon the election it might also be remarked that inasmuch as Oregon went almost unanimously for the present administration, confidence established, should urge on the good work of growth, development and prosperity, and hence good times in store for everybody that wants to "earn his bread by the sweat of his brow." Crops have brought good prices, especially so in regard to hops, and the farmers feel that after all, life is worth living so, are beginning to make themselves as comfortable as circumstances will permit. Many farmers with money are among the homeseekers settling here and as quickly as they proceeds.

building a spur from Eugene to the company's mill on the bank of the river, a distance of about a mile and a half. That this will greatly facilitate the handling of the mill's product is understood without saying, but nevertheless an interesting bit of news. Right of way for the spur has been secured and work of construction will commence soon.

J. A. Morris has sold the machinery in his planing mill at Condon to Herbert Halstead who may remove the plant from its present location to one more suitable and then start it up next spring. For the present it will remain idle. At this place too, business is looking up and there is reason to believe that the venture next season will prove a profitable one.

Thompson & Flynn have commenced operations at Gopher, a small place near McMinnville. The mill was closed down for repairs to the machinery for some time.

The Northwest Timber Company has purchased from various owners 8,380 acres of timber land in township 5, range 30 south, Umatilla county, for \$710 per claim of which there were 50 in the deal. The claims cost the entrymen \$400 each, according to report from Pendleton, so they cleared \$300 each.

AMERICAN CLAIMS EARLDOM.

Kansas City Man Heir to Ancient Titles.

New York, Nov. 19.—Robert Barclay Allardice, whose claim to the dormant earldoms of Strathern, Mentith and Airth, in the peerage of Scotland, who will be heard in the next session of the house of lords, will be opposed, according to the Herald's London correspondent, by George G. Marshall Graham, of Kansas City, whose interests in England are reported by his cousin, W. M. Graham Easton. Mr. Graham, who was born in Edinburgh, on Nov. 18, 1852, is the eldest surviving son of the late James Graham, of Leitchtown, Monteth, Perthshire. The earldom of Strathern dates from 1371 and the earldoms of Airth and Mentith, from 1633 and 1427 respectively.

It is claimed by Barclay Allardice that the Grahams of Gartmore, are now extinct and that the way is thus left clear for himself.
