**THANKSGIVING  
IN NEW YORK**

400,000 Turkeys Consumed—  
Most of Them Were Sold at  
30 Cents per Pound.

**GREAT CROWDS IN COUNTRY**

650 Trains of 3000 Cars Carry 70,000  
People From One Terminal to  
Points Located in New  
England.

New York, Nov. 24.—More persons whose homes are in New York are spending the day in the country than ever before on a Thanksgiving, to judge by the records made in the various railroad stations. At one terminal about 650 trains with more than 3000 cars were handled which carried about 70,000 passengers to New England and points up the state. It is estimated that more than 400,000 turkeys were necessary to fill the demand in this city alone and most of this vast number were sold at 30 cents a pound.

As the statement which connects Christian Science with this case is wholly without foundation or truth I am sure you will gladly give space as correction to the following letter which was published by me in the Oregonian Nov. 19, in connection with the same report.

"I have today by wire thoroughly investigated this report, and learn on reliable authority that Christian Science had no connection with the case whatsoever, but that the child had been under the care of a magnetic doctor, who now publicly states that he applied almost every remedy except Christian Science in his futile efforts. In connection with this mistaken report, it may be well to state that it is the earnest desire of Christian Scientists generally to render painstaking obedience to the quarantine regulations of their communities.

This point was especially emphasized some two years ago by Mrs. Eddy, when she admonished Christian Scientists to decline to doctor contagious or infectious diseases under the existing attitude and demand of public thought, thereby to indicate their considerate regard for the general opinion of their fellow-men who think not on these matters as they do."
