GOOD WAGES AT PANAMA

First Dredge and Crane Men Have Started for Canal—They Travel Free.

UNCLE SAM PAYS EXPENSES

Board, Room and Hospital Service Furnished—Only Union Men It is Known Will Be Employed.

Chicago, Nov. 26.—Two dredgemen, the first engaged for work on the isthmian canal have left Chicago for Panama. They were William Bates, dredge engineer and Phillip Bates, his brother, crane man. They were engaged through the officers of the international brotherhood of steam shovel and dredgemen, the members of which organization will be hired for the work.

The engineers will receive \$190 and the crane men \$165 a month on the canal. The men will be furnished free transportation from New York to Colon and return. While in the government service they will be provided with board and room free and will be cared for in government hospitals if sick.

"Within 18 months," said secretary T. J. Dolan jr., of the Brotherhood, I expect that 200 dredgemen will be working on the canal on 60 steam shovels."

PRESIDENTIAL PARTY ARRIVES.

No Mishap Mars Start for Day's Sight-seeing.

St. Louis, Nov. 26.—President's day at the Louisiana Purchase exposition dawned with clear skies and a brisk wind of just sufficient sharpness to send the blood tingling through the veins, ideal weather for carrying out the strenuous programme arranged by the nation's chief executive, who proposes to acquire in one day a comprehensive idea of the greatest exposition in the history of the world.

Although President Roosevelt was not officially greeted by the exposition management until after 9 o'clock the grounds were thronged long before that hour and every car line terminating at the world's fair poured its hundreds every hour into the approaches to the exposition gates.

By the request of President Roosevelt's private secretary, the itinerary of the trip through the grounds was not made public, and consequently while there were no immense throngs congregated at any one spot at one time, the general programme was known and the probable route of the presidential party was lined on either side by hundreds of people, many of whom had travelled hundreds of miles to see the president of the United States. The presidential special train arrived in St. Louis at 3:40 this morning and was taken at once to the world's fair grounds where it was parked on the side track on the north side of the transportation building.

Extraordinary precautions were taken to prevent accident after the special arrived within the jurisdiction of the St. Louis terminal association, 250 men having been stationed along the right of way so close together that each man was in sight of the one stationed on either side of him.

In order to avoid the Eads bridge tunnel trains which pass beneath several down town streets before arriving at the union station, the presidential train was switched upon the tracks of the Illinois Transfer company at The Willows, Ill., and taken across the Merchants' bridge, thence to the terminal yards in St. Louis by way of the terminal elevated tracks the terminal yards the train was taken by the Wabash railroad to Union boulevard junction where the Rock Island switched it into the exposition grounds at the administration entrance.

When the train arrived at its destination, two companies of the sixteenth infantry, U. S. A. who had been awaiting it went on guard and no one was allowed to approach within 100 feet of the darkened Pullmans.

The distinguished party was early ready, preparing for their day of record-breaking sightseeing. In the party are President Roosevelt, Mrs. Roosevelt, Miss Roosevelt, Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Robinson, Secretary and Mrs. Loeb and Surgeon-General Rixey, U. S. N.
