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

J., for a term of years and has an option on its purchase. The place Rooms 50c, 75c, \$1.00 and \$1.50 embraces 400 acres and represents an investment of about \$250,000. Many well known racers were bred there, and it is understood Mr. Thomas will shortly put into effect his plans for breeding another stable. The Gideon horses will be transferred to Kentucky.

He Gets His.

New York, Dec. 10 .- A sentence of four months in prison has been pronounced on the editor of a Dresden Newspaper for asserting, says, a Times dispatch from Berlin, that great dissatisfaction prevailed in Saxony because the civil list of the new king had been increased, although the people were suffering under a great tax burden. EAST INDIAN METHODS.

A Servant's Subtle but Unsuccessful Scheme For Revenge.

A trade journal tells a story of ar adventure which nearly cost one of its correspondents in India his life. The unsuccessful suitor, Laj, began to make trouble, and his rival, the husband, warned the merchant against him. Nothing happened for some months. Then the merchant went away on business.
