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FOR TARIFF REVISION

The Stand-Patters Opposed to Any Changes in Schedules

ROLL OF CONGRESS TAKEN

Majority of Those Interviewed Are Opposed to Any Changes in the Tariff at the Present Time.

Washington, Dec. 12.—Between the ardent tariff revisionist and the extreme "stand-patter" stands the conservative member of congress whose judgment is so potent in both houses of the national legislation. He is not talking much for publication or doing any shouting, but he is doing a great deal of thinking and he is asking many questions. To the excited revisionist he calmly says: "Precisely; and what schedules do you say need revision?" To the rabid "stand-patter" he says: "Didn't the republican platform declare that the republican party stood ready to revise the tariff when the necessity arose?" To the newspaper man in whom he has confidence he says: "My dear fellow, don't be in a hurry. I am going to master this subject before I talk about it. I don't know just where I stand myself yet, but I am going to find out. Last year we cleared up Cuban reciprocity, enacted a mighty good anti-rebate bill, and started off the Panama canal; pretty good work for one year, wasn't it? Now we are going to look into this tariff question and find out if there exists a genuine necessity for revision. If we find there does we will do it. If we find there is no need we won't try it. Just let me do a little hard studying now, and come around after a while and I can talk upon the subject intelligently."

This anonymous member is typical of a majority of the membership of both houses of congress today, as he is typical of a majority of American citizens. He will approach the subject without previous study and without prejudice, and he believes that when he reaches a conclusion it is likely to be correct.

Some members of congress have already studied the subject, especially certain phases of it and they are willing to give the results of their application.
