SIX TO ONE.
Lowe Gets One Year and Stauch Six Years for Stealing.
Two more unfortunates were committed to the penitentiary from Clatsop county yesterday by Judge McBride. Harry Lowe, who stole a pair of shoes, was truly repentant and wept copiously when he was brought before the tribunal of justice to answer to his crime. Fred Stauch maintained the same defiant attitude that has characterized his incarceration in the county jail. He was ordered to stand up. The judge in pronouncing sentence said:
"The crime of larceny in a warehouse is a very serious offense, the more so when it is committed by an employe of the company robbed, and still more so when committed by a man of intelligence. It is a hard matter to send a man to the penitentiary, when that man has a family depending upon him for support, but it is one of the unfortunate circumstances with which a court has to contend in the discharge of its official duty. I am aware that this defendant has a wife. In fact, I received a very pitiful letter

from her a few days ago appealing for mercy in behalf of her husband. It was the most pitiful letter I ever received. The woman has my sympathy, but that is a matter the defendant should have considered before he committed his crime. I don't take into consideration to any extent the fact that this man has broken jail, as I believe it is any man's privilege to escape from jail, if he can. I don't believe I should want to stay in jail if I was innocent and if I was guilty, I know I would not want to stay there. In this case I take into consideration only the fact that the defendant has pleaded guilty, it is the one extenuating circumstance, and it is the judgment of this court that he be imprisoned in the penitentiary for a period of six years."
Stauch made no reply and gave no evidence that it affected him in any way.
Harry Lowe was immediately arraigned on two informations, one charging him with larceny in a warehouse by stealing a pair of shoes from the railway warehouse and the other charging him with larceny in a Jewell-

ing for stealing a silver watch from John Tenhart, one of the prisoners in the county jail at the time. Lowe escaped from that institution. The first information had been changed from that of burglary at the request of the defendant. He pleaded guilty to the first charge and the second one was dismissed. Mr. Eakin also appeared for this defendant. He said Lowe was only 19 years of age, had been thrown on the world since he was a small boy and unfortunately was a victim of dime novel reading. He asked for the lowest penalty as he did not think anything could be gained in sending him up for so long a term that his life would be ruined. District Attorney Allen said the original indictment was for burglary for which the lowest penalty was two years, but at the defendant's request he had changed it to the lower offense. He said but for the fact that the boy had broken jail and stolen a watch when doing so he would have recommended a jail sentence. He also said that when arrested Lowe had a detective badge, a revolver, a pair of handcuffs and a kit of tools that would permit him to enter any house. Judge

McBride in pronouncing judgment turned toward the defendant and said:
"You can now see where dishonesty brings you. Had you been honest you would not be here today to receive sentence. On the recommendation of the district attorney I shall give you the lightest penalty, one year. Remember that no man ever got rich by being dishonest, such methods have but one ending and that is the penitentiary. Perhaps my leniency may do you some good and perhaps it will not. I extend it to you in the hope that when you are released you will go to some community and lead an honest and upright life."
Murderer Held.
San Francisco, Dec. 31.—The application for a writ of habeas corpus for the release of Chan Cheung, indicted by the grand jury for the murder of Tom Yick of the Chinese Educational Society was argued before Judge Lawlor. The question at issue was the release of the defendant on bonds. The judge denied the writ and remanded the prisoner into the custody of the sheriff.
