WEALTHY RECLUSE.

Estate of Firman Dubel Proves a Surprise.
New York, Jan. 4.—Gold, silver, and bills amounting to more than \$10,000 have been found secreted about the home of Firman Dubel, who died recently at Burlington, N. J.
For years Dubel had lived as a recluse, denying that he had any wealth, other than his home and the spacious grounds that surrounded it. It is now estimated by the relatives that his estate will amount to between \$300,000 and \$500,000.
Search among other papers after the death of the recluse brought to light scores of mortgages on properties of the residents of the town and in the country for miles around. He had no faith in banks and invested his income as rapidly as it accumulated.

Big Bond Issue.
New York, Jan. 4.—At a special meeting in Corinth, N. Y., stockholders of the International Paper Company have formally ratified the recent-

ly proposed issue of \$10,000,000, consolidated mortgage 5 per cent 30-year convertible gold bonds. The bonds are to cover the cost of improvement already made in various mills and other construction work.
