CANCER IS CURABLE

So Say New York Scientists at Buffalo.

THEY HAVE CURED ANIMALS

Now Searching for a Human Serum
That Can Be Applied to Mankind
Afflicted with the Dreadful
Disease—Details.

Buffalo, N. Y., Jan. 12.—Scientists who since 1899 have been studying cancer at the Gratiwick Pathological Laboratory of the University of Buffalo, under the patronage of the state of New York, are stated to be preparing a report which indicates that they are nearing the solution of a great problem.

According to men who have taken part in the work, it has been proved that cancer is a parasitic disease, being infectious in type; it has been transplanted and reproduced in perfectly healthy animals; that the reproduction has been through cancer as it exists in the human, and that the disease in animals has been cured by the administration of a serum prepared in the laboratory. What remains now is the application of the results of animal experimentation to the cure of the disease as it exists in the human being.

Much work remains to be done before Dr. Roswell Park, director of the laboratory, will be prepared to make the final announcement of a serum suitable for use in the alleviation and cure of cancer in human beings, but that this will be forthcoming in due time is declared to be an almost assured fact. Additional interest is given to the matter because of the conclusion reached recently by the cancer commission of Harvard medical college, when that body gave up all further consideration of the subject and announced that cancer was neither contagious nor hereditary; and the only cure for the disease was early operation at the hands of the surgeon and that no discovery had been made which offers any hope for cure of cancer.

The white mice used for the experiments in the Buffalo laboratory were obtained from Prof. Jensen of Copenhagen, about a year ago. Although the animals died between New York and Buffalo, inoculations from one were successful in several mice and by repeated transplantation a large number of mice with cancer have been available for experimentation. The occurrence which led to the discovery of the serum in question was the spontaneous recovery of several mice which had been inoculated.

The field which is opened by these primary experiments is apparently a difficult one, but the scientists are fully confident that they prove in principle that not only is cancer curable, but extend the hope that some means may be found to develop a similar human serum which can be applied to human beings.

Guilty, but Hurt.

"I was governor of my state for two terms," said a well known western politician, "and I made up my mind as soon as I was sworn in the first time to right any wrong I might find in the two state prisons. I had some-how got the idea that many innocent men were sent there."

"I did. There were over a thousand convicts in all, and I investigated 350 cases before I stopped. According to his own story, every one was an innocent man and the victim of injustice. There was just one exception. He had been sent to prison for stealing a cow, and he lied to me for a long time. At length, one day after I had gone over the case with him for the fifth time and showed him that he must be guilty, he said:

"It's no use to try to deceive you, governor. I'll admit that I did the stealing, but what hurts my feelings is the mistake they made. It wasn't a cow at all, but a blamed old jackass, and the jury convicted me because it was sworn to that he gave twelve quarts of milk a day."—Chicago News.

Dining With John Adams.

In the year 1818 Henry Bradshaw Pearson, an Englishman, dined with John Adams, second president of the United States, at the Boston home of the fine old statesman, then eighty-four years old. The Sunday dinner was as follows: First course, a pudding made of Indian corn, molasses and butter; second, veal, bacon, neck of mutton, potatoes, cabbages, carrots and Indian beans; Madeira wine, of which each drank two glasses. "We sat down to dinner at 1 o'clock. At 2 nearly all went a second time to church. For tea we had pound cake, sweet bread and butter and bread made of Indian corn and rye. Tea was brought from the kitchen and handed round by a neat white servant girl." Pearson says further, "The establishment of this political patriarch consists of a house two stories high, containing, I believe, eight rooms, of two men and three maid servants, three horses and a plain carriage."

An Ancient Irish Custom.

In the district known as "the barony of Forth," in County Wexford, Ireland, is to be found a race of hardworking, industrious peasants, living in thatched cottages with clean, whitewashed walls, which by their perfect whiteness at once arrest the attention of the visitor. These people differ in many respects from the inhabitants of the other parts of the same county and have habits and customs peculiar to themselves. When a funeral takes place two wooden crosses are provided. On the way to the cemetery a halt is made at a certain spot by the side of the road. Here prayers are said for the deceased, after which one cross is deposited in a hawthorn bush or under it. The procession then goes on its way, and after the interment the other cross is fixed at the head of the grave. This strange custom dates from time immemorial, as the great pile of crosses by the roadside indicates.
