Portland, Jan. 15.-Onions and potatoes are the firm basis of the local produce markets on account of the cold weather that has prevented shipments in a great degree. The shippers who sent their potatoes to the southern markets will reap the advantage of a 10c to 15c advance that is now quoted kettle rendered, tierced, 9%c. in San Francisco. Onions are being held by the farmers and southern ship- 607c. ments are likely to be light on account this market.

Fresh meats, eggs and poultry are all on a firm base, and prices are likely to be the best that have ruled for some time. Fresh fish are scarce, also, and smelt are hard to get. Cold storage salmon stock is also running very low. Sugar is holding its own, and the expected decline has not come. Stocks are low and the retailers will be stuck as few have stocks.


