J. Piermont Morgan Has Annexed the Whole Empire.

ALL OFF WITH THE DOWAGER

Pierp. Will Likely Organize a Stock Company to Handle the Imperial Family as a Side Show to a Railroad Exhibit.

San Francisco, Jan. 27 .- William M. Pinkston, one of the officials of the Canton-Hankow Railway Company of China, has arrived here from the orient on his way east to purchase material for the construction of the proposed line between the two cities named, of which 29 miles have already been finished. About 750 miles of road between Canton and Hankow are to be built. The work will begin in June and is expected to be completed in three years. It was recently reported from Brussels that Pierpont Morgan had purchased the king of Belgium's interest in the Canton-Hankow road and American interests so as eventually to cover the Franco-Belgian concession for a line from Hankow to Pekin, thereby making a trunk line of about 2500 miles from Pekin to Canton. years," she writes, "I endured insuff. must be sold at once. Newspapers.
