

# SUMMER RESORT

Seaside the Most Picturesque on the Coast.

BOTH PLEASURE AND HEALTH

Surf Bathing Enjoyed by Thousands of People—Mountain Streams Abound With Food Fishes—Forests With Game.

Among the many attractions of Clatsop county and which will be visited by thousands of eastern people this summer, is the famous Seaside summer resort. It has more and greater advantages than any other resort in Oregon and is more accessible. It has transcontinental connection with three of the largest railroads in the United States. The Astoria & Columbia River railroad terminates at Seaside and it makes transcontinental connections at Goble with the Northern Pacific, the O. R. & N. Co., at Astoria and the Southern Pacific at Portland.

Nature has endowed Seaside with all the necessities and requirements of an ideal summer resort. Along the beach that stretches 20 miles from Tillamook head to Fort Stevens, where bathing is enjoyed, the scenery is beautiful and grand. Between the Pacific ocean and the Necanicum river is a picturesque grove, dotted over with the white tents and summer cottages of people who come to enjoy the sea breezes. Scattered here and there through the grove is the handsome summer residences of the wealth of Portland and interior cities, as well as the more humble cottages of those in moderate circumstances. Between the Necanicum and O'Hanna is situated the town of Seaside, a prosperous town of nearly 1000 inhabitants, incorporated under the laws of the state of Oregon, governed by a mayor and common council. Every business is represented. There are six hotels, three grocery and general merchandise stores, two drug stores, two barber shops, three churches—Methodist, Episcopal and Catholic—and good schools.

A large saw mill and box factory is located here, the Seaside Spruce Lumber Company, giving employment to about 100 men in the mill and logging camps, with a monthly payroll of about \$5000. The company manufactures the finest grade of spruce lumber for export trade, and has more orders than it can fill. In addition to the attractions of Seaside as a summer resort, it affords sport for the hunter and fishermen. In its mountain streams are trout and other food fishes. In the forests are all kinds of game. The level roads afford the pleasure of driving. The two rivers furnish unbounded sport for rowing and sailing. No other summer resort has so many and varied attractions. These facts are becoming known and appreciated. It is estimated that the population of Seaside during the summer months of July and August approximate about 10,000. A large number of families remain during September, it being considered the most pleasant month of the year.

As a health resort Seaside has no superior and very few equals. It is not a "cure all" for all the ailments of mankind, but it invigorates and builds up the system, is a sure cure for "summer complaint" and even has a salutary effect upon people troubled with "constitutional weariness," and is an eradicator of the "blues." It destroys the germs of malaria and people who go there and remain two months feel as though they had "been born again." It has completed one of the finest water systems in the state where pure mountain water is supplied to the inhabitants and to cottages in the grove. It has no \$5 or \$10 a day hotels where a person pays \$2 for a 25 cent meal and \$2.25 for style. Snobbery and affectation are entirely eliminated.

All restraint is thrown off, and people, rich and poor, professed and professed publican and slaver mingle with each other and all enjoy the beauties of nature, the grandeur of the mountains, the health giving sea breezes, mountain scenery, boating, fishing and hunting. All come to have a good time and they have it. No other summer resort in the world gives such inducements, such a variety of recreation and unalloyed happiness and pleasure. The people are kind and hospitable and the latch string is always out.

# LOCAL OPTION BEAT

## Bill Defeated in the Washington Legislature.

### INSPECTION BILL IS PASSED

### The Senate Indefinitely Postponed Capital Removal Resolution Introduced to Displace the Bill Defeated.

Olympia, March 3.—Several important bills were disposed of today. The local option bill came up in the house this afternoon and was defeated by a vote of 49 to 35. The bill was similar to the one adopted in Oregon last June. The bill giving to tide land lease holders the preference right to purchase the land was defeated. The sockeye salmon bill prescribing the closed season for fishing on Puget sound of six weeks in 1906 and 1908, was indefinitely postponed. The bill putting a prohibitory license upon peddling of agricultural and household articles was defeated.

The house passed the state bankers association bill. The senate indefinitely postponed the capital removal resolution which was introduced to take the place of the senate bill of the same import, which was vetoed by the governor. The bill making the office of clerk of the supreme court elective was killed. The factory inspection bill was passed by the senate and having passed the house now goes to the governor.
