

ENFORCE THE LAWS

f Portland's Police Don't. He Will.

CLOSE SALOONS ON SUNDAY

Tom Word Determined That the Police Shall Enforce the Laws in Portland, and If They Don't He Will Enforce the State Laws.

Portland, March 6.—Sheriff Tom Word says that unless the rules and regulations regarding the government of the North End are more strictly enforced, he will close all the saloons in Portland on Sunday.

"I can't enforce the city ordinances, but I can enforce the state laws," said Sheriff Word. "I can't enforce the saloons to take out their stairways to the women's apartments, neither can I enforce the 1 o'clock ordinance, but I can close them on Sundays."

Last night and Saturday night Word carefully inspected the conditions in this district, and while he found in the majority of cases the places had obeyed his orders, yet in some of them he found control rather lax, due, he said, to the nonenforcement of the city ordinances by the police. Some of the saloons have so far failed to comply with the city regulations removing the stairways and selling liquor to women in boxes and on the second floor from the lower bar. They also remained open after 1 o'clock. In the Paris house he found too many loafers going through the halls and this he says the police should prohibit.

Slot Machines.
Slot machines must go. So declared Mayor Williams today, the order going forth from the office of the municipal executive that the recently enacted ordinance would be enforced, and all slot machines of whatever character or for whatever purpose would be closed in Portland. The mayor will authorize the chief of police to enforce the new ordinance at once. Following is his statement regarding the matter:

"I have tried to carry out all the wishes of the council regarding slot machines. First there was an ordinance passed to allow them to run for merchandise, and I carried out this ordinance according to its terms. Then there was an ordinance passed to license card slot machines. Now at ordinance has been passed in which card slot machines are prohibited for any purpose, and I am going to enforce the provisions of this ordinance as I have the others. Long ago I prohibited the use of slot machines for money, and they have been out of use for some time."

IMPRESSIVE CEREMONIES.

In Honor of Memory of Mrs. Stanford at Palo Alto.

Palo Alto, Cal., March 5.—While this morning's impressive service in honor of the memory of Mrs. Stanford was being conducted in the Memorial church, Chaplain Gardner, preacher to the University and favorite minister of Mrs. Stanford, was lying at his home in the campus almost at death's door with typhoid fever. His condition is so serious that his physicians deem it unwise to inform him of Mrs. Stanford's death. It had been Mrs. Stanford's wish that in the event of her death Rev. Gardner should officiate at the funeral services.

PREACHER STEALS.

Rebs a Young Girl of Her Money by Hypnotic Influence.

Albany, Ore., March 6.—Testimony being taken in Albany in the case of Ambler vs. Hood, brought in the circuit court in Multnomah county is revealing a good many sensational facts. The case is a suit for damages brought by D. L. Ambler of Portland as guardian of Mary B. Hardman, against "Rev." A. B. Hood and his wife, M. E. Hood, now residing in Portland, but until recently residents of Linn county. The plaintiff alleges that the defendants, by unlawful means, have secured almost all the property inherited by Miss Hardman, who was making her home with the Hood family.

Miss Hardman's father, Christopher Hardman, who was a well-known and comparatively wealthy farmer of Linn county, died about two years ago, leaving his children considerable property. Miss Mary's inheritance consisted of a large farm in a splendid locality on the road from Albany to Lebanon, a valuable timber claim in Eastern Linn county, and smaller pieces of farm property in this county, together with some money.

When her father died the young lady went to live with the Hoods, who resided in the "Tennessee neighborhood," about three miles north of Lebanon. Hood had been a Baptist preacher up to this time and was comparatively penniless, but he now settled down to

live as a gentleman - of leisure and abandoned his ministerial labors.

Trolley Car Accident.

New York, March 6.—A trolley car of the New Williamsburg bridge escaped the control of the motorman last night and running down grade, crashed into the Manhattan terminal and was overturned. The conductor was probably fatally hurt. Three passengers escaped with slight injuries.

Council of War.

St. Petersburg, March 6.—The council of war which was called to meet today to discuss important questions relating to the war and the defeat of Kuropatkin, was postponed until tomorrow.

Japs Arrested.

Manila, March 6.—The customs officials have arrested three Japanese fishermen in connection with the alleged attempt to sink the British steamer Carlisle, now at anchor in this port. A galling gun has been placed on board the Carlisle. The Japanese consul here is assisting in the effort now being made to clear up the mystery which surrounds the affair.

English Sealers.

San Francisco, March 6.—Several English sealers are now off this coast awaiting crews. The vessels, which are forbidden to enter port, have been lying off Monterey and the crews are being sent out to them. A crew of four men was sent from this city today for the sealer Vera.

Crushed By a Tree.

Enterprise, March 6.—Rev. Clemens was crushed to death by a falling tree on his farm at Promise, death being almost instantaneous. His son was felling the tree and Mr. Clemens went near to drive away a cow that seemed to be in danger of getting hit by the tree as it was about to topple over.

FRAUD IS EXPOSED

Spiritualistic Seance That Came to Grief.

CORPULENT IMPOSTER OUT

Calvert Berwick of Virginia Causes a Sensational Exposure of a Materialized Medium in the Midst of a Crowded House.

New York, March 6.—Calvert Berwick, a native of Virginia, has caused a sensational exposure of a materializing medium in the latter's Lexington avenue apartments. In the midst of a seance in a crowded room the medium, a woman, weighing 300 pounds, was dragged shrieking from her cabinet and tossed into the center of the circle of dupes.

She fought like a trapped tigress. Furniture was smashed, men knocked down and glass broken, before the woman and her husband were finally subdued. Then three gas jets were lighted and the medium was found gasping in the center of the room, clad in a mass of gauze, coated with phosphorescent paint. Half her spiritual garb and her head piece were in the possession of Berwick.

According to the Virginian, his mother—a resident of this city, has lost thousands of dollars in investments made through the advice of the spirits and Berwick stated that he intended to prosecute, criminally and civilly, the mediums responsible for the loss.

The exposure was one of the most sensational and complete ever made in this city. Berwick's cousin, Harrison Grindley, was with him at the seance and struck a light while the fight was going on in the cabinet. Immediately half a dozen or more confederates attacked the two interlopers.

They were floored in quick succession and after a great effort the woman was dragged into the light. About her hung a mass of cheap cheese cloth liberally smeared with the phosphorescent paint while a remarkable looking head piece had been torn away by Berwick. It was found to consist of the top of an old felt hat with the brim cut off, around which had been wound yards of the cheesecloth.

A piece of old silk had been cut and sewed to form a mask for the face. This was just transparent enough to give the outline of the features beneath. A tinkling music box which had been wound up just before, played "Peace, Abide With Thee," during the fight.

STRIKE IN NEW YORK

Strike on Subway and Elevated Lines.

NUMBER OF MEN IMPORTED

Opinion of the Executive Committee of the Amalgamated Association That a Strike Cannot Be Averted—Company Will Mobilize.

New York, March 6.—It has been learned that 526 men who arrived here last night and were quartered aboard a steamer in the North river, were brought from various cities of the west to forestall a threatened strike on the subway and elevated lines controlled by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company.

In spite of the efforts to keep the arrival of the men a secret, the employees of the Interborough company were informed and at a meeting of the executive committee of the Amalgamated Association, which did not break up until this morning the situation was thoroughly discussed. The opinion was unofficially expressed that a strike cannot be averted.

It is understood that agents acting for the company expect to mobilize a force of at least 1000. The first clause of the contracts with them specifies that the applicant, "Fully understands that this is for strike work in the city of New York."

Those who desert are to receive no pay whatever.

In some quarters it was reported that an ultimatum had been prepared for presentation to General Manager Hedley and that all plans were ready to call a strike in the absence of an immediate settlement.

Officials of the labor unions controlling the railway employees went up and down the lines of the elevated and subway, it was reported, and by midnight every motorman, conductor, guard and station agent had been notified to be ready at a moment's notice. President Pepper of the employers' association refused to be interviewed. He was reported to be in conference with the executive committee and to have received word from time to time from the delegates who were notifying the trainmen.

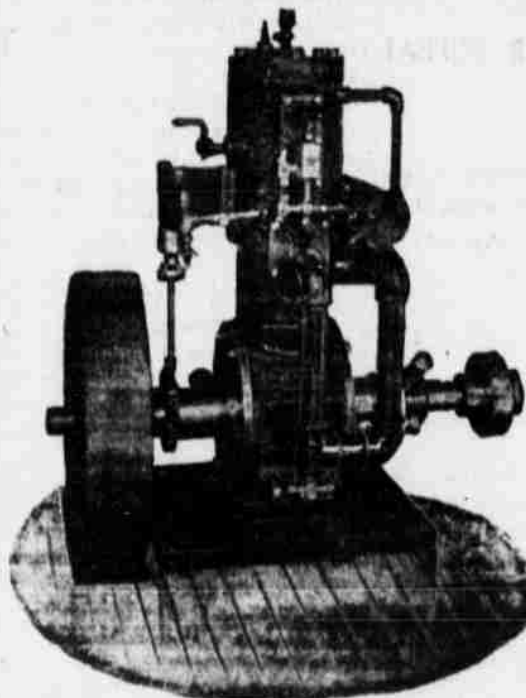
