OUR GOOD LOOKS.

Care of the Skin, Teeth and Hair.

The woman with good complexion, even, well cared for teeth and neatly kept hair can never be uncomely. All these are within reach of every woman, so that it is evident no woman need be hopelessly plain. Even with irregular features a woman's face may always beam with good temper and intelligence if she so wills it and takes pains to acquire these graces.

To have a good complexion absolute cleanliness of the skin is necessary, so that it can be unclogged in doing its work of throwing off waste matter. You can tell the moment you set eyes upon a person's face, neck and ears whether the individual keeps the skin clean. The perfectly kept skin has a burnished, almost transparent look. The blood shines through it and gives it a real radiance. The neglected skin, on the other hand, is dull, coarse grained and fairly gummy.

In washing the body two points are to be remembered—first, to cleanse the skin properly, hot water, soap and vigorous scrubbing with a brush are necessary; next, cold water sprayed or dashed over the skin afterward prevents taking cold. One needs two brushes, a stiff one for the body, a softer one for the face and throat. Almost any kind of brush will do for the body. For the face comes specially an oval brush about two inches wide by three and one-half long. This face brush is sold in drug and department stores and is not expensive. In using the brush move it with a circular motion, always backward and upward from the mouth. About three times a week a brisk scrubbing with brushes is needed all over the body. The other days a less strenuous bath may be taken.

Lemon juice has a bleaching effect on the skin, glycerin a softening effect. Mixed in equal parts and well shaken, one counteracts the ill effects of the other, and the two together constitute one of the best skin lotions ever devised. Apply, rubbing in well, to face, neck and hands after the bath. A few drops of a favorite perfume may be added.

Care of the Teeth.

With a country full of the best dentists in the world, there is no excuse for bad teeth in the mouth of any person in America. First, keep them clean; second, have them examined by a good dentist once a year. That is all. To keep them clean brush with a moderately stiff brush every night before retiring, and do it thoroughly. About twice a week use the tooth pow-

der your dentist recommends. Once a year at least have the dentist scrape or cleanse the tartar and discoloration from your teeth.

A foolish fad is one lately for "bleaching" the teeth, as it is called. Don't do it. It injures the teeth, and in time they again become discolored as badly as ever. Just keep them clean and

take care of your health. Our dentists have evolved a white porcelain filling that promises to supersede the gold fillings.

Children's teeth should be looked after closely in the growing stage. Crooked, too prominent or unduly crowded teeth mar sometimes the whole beauty of a girl's face, or a man's either, for that matter. Watch your children's teeth, and if there is tendency to abnormality in their growth consult the best dentist you know of and have the abnormality corrected.

Let none grudge the money paid to a skillful dentist. It is far better to have a pretty mouth than to have costly clothes upon one's back.

Beautiful Hair.

It can only be said over and again that to have fine hair it must be kept clean. Dingy, "gummy" hair is an unspeakable horror. The first duty of those who have the care of the shining coats of blooded horses is to remove from them all dust. Let us take a lesson from this. Even the longest, heaviest hair should be washed once a month. A pure soap and abundance of hot soft water, with plenty of rubbing of the scalp, are all that one needs. The soap must be entirely rinsed out of the hair, and it must afterward be thoroughly dried.

Massage of the scalp is admirable. To perform it run your finger tips into your hair and press them firmly upon the scalp. Then, without letting them slip, gently work the skin beneath them around and around with spiral action. Keep this up from time to time till the skin of your head will move freely to the touch over any part of the skull. This promotes growth of the hair.
