California Strawberries Coming in Large Quantities.

General Resume of the Markets for the Past 24 Hours Shows a Firm and Steady Tone in All Lines of Farm Products.

California strawberries are coming in plentiful and are quoted at \$1.75 a crate. Oregon rhubarb is plentiful at 2¢ per pound. New potatoes from California command 3 1/2¢ a pound.
