

### CHLOROFORM OSLER

Medical Apathy on Part of Doctors Cause of Death.

### RECIPROCITY IS ADVOCATED

The Only Difference Between the Homeopaths and the Allopaths is the Difference in the Name on Bottles of Nauseating Drugs Supplied.

Baltimore, April 28.—In his farewell address to the Medical profession of Maryland before leaving for his post as regius professor in the university of Oxford, Dr. William Osler urged the fusion of medical colleges in this and other cities of the country.

Medicine gives more hope for humanity than anything else, he said, and combination and reciprocity are the great needs. Reciprocity between the state boards also should be extended, he believed, so that a doctor's activities should not be limited in moving from state to state.

"It is time," he continued, "that the homeopathic brethren were coming into the fold. A difference in drugs should no longer separate men with the same hope. The original quarrel is ours, but the homeopaths should not allow themselves to be separated by a shibboleth that is in constant touch with their practical use."

"The most dangerous foe to medical science is apathy. Thirty five percent of the deaths in a community are due to apathy, which goes to counterbalance the advance of medicine in the last century."

### SAND ISLAND LEASED.

Secretary of War Has Decided That the Government Owns It.

Notwithstanding the opposition to the leasing of Sand Island and the protest and remonstrances filed in Washington, the secretary of war yesterday approved the leases to the island and formally concurred in the opinion recently expressed by Major Langfitt that this island is the property of the United States government, and that, as such, it should yield a revenue from those who use it for fishing purposes. The secretary today signed an order

directing that hereafter Sand Island shall be divided into five sites, bids to be invited by the local engineer office at Portland, awards to be made in every instance to the highest bidder.

The secretary further directs that leases for the ensuing year at once be made with those fishermen who recently submitted their highest offers to Major Langfitt, namely:

- Site 2, T. A. O. Stensland ..... \$1920
- Site 3, Howard Winter ..... 1500
- Site 4, Walter L. Pulliam ..... 600
- Site 5, Hansen & Olsen ..... 750

Two men, W. L. Pulliam and W. E. Tallant, offered \$400 each for Site 1, this being the maximum offer. They will decide by lot which shall secure this contract.

In passing upon the case, the secretary holds that Sand Island is distinctly the property of the United States, and not of the state of Washington, as had been implied by a telegram from Governor Mead. Furthermore, he points out that the fact that the fishermen are willing to pay \$5120 per year for the use of this island indicates its value. Under all the circumstances, the secretary maintains that the government must enforce its right to collect revenue for the use of this island, and will do so from this time on. Persons not holding leases from the government will be prohibited from landing on Sand Island.

The secretary's action today is in the face of direct opposition from many local interests. Governor Mead of Washington, objected to leasing, on the ground that the fishermen using the island were operating under Washington state permits. Representative Humphrey also filed a very vigorous protest against the leasing plan, and Senator Fulton requested that, if the land be leased, no action be taken until after the close of the present season.

### BLUE AND THE GRAY

Confederates and Johnnies Will Join Memorial Day.

BE GUESTS OF GRANT POST

Senator Blackburn of Kentucky Will Deliver the Memorial Day Oration at Grant's Tomb, and Veterans Will March Side by Side in Parade.

New York, April 28.—Four hundred confederate veterans, members of the local camp, are to be the guests of the United States Grant post, G. A. R., on Memorial day, and from 9 a. m. until late at night the veterans of the two armies will mingle.

Senator Blackburn of Kentucky is to deliver the oration of the day at Grant's tomb. It will be the first time that confederate veterans have thus marched with union veterans in this city.

According to the program the veterans will first parade in Brooklyn. Thence they will go by boat to Grant's tomb overlooking the Hudson. Luncheon will be served aboard the boat and after the exercises, the entire party will return to Brooklyn by water where dinner will be served.

The United States Grant post, two weeks ago voted unanimously to invite the confederate veteran camp to parade with the post, and a committee which attended a meeting of the confederate veterans camp has received the acceptance of the latter.

### CHARGES AGAINST LOOMIS.

President Roosevelt Approves of Secretary Taft's Proposition.

Washington, April 28.—Secretary Taft, it is understood, tonight heard from President Roosevelt, approving his proposition to direct Minister Herbert W. Bowen at Caracas to report to Washington and explain the charges made against Assistant Secretary Loomis of the state department, which were communicated to Secretary Taft by the minister. Secretary Taft will accordingly act in the matter tomorrow.

### NO MORE SLUMMING

Automobiles Not to Be Allowed in Chinatown.

### NO OBJECTION TO VISITORS

Streets of Chinatown Are So Narrow That in Case of a Fire the Automobiles Would Be in the Way and Hamper Efforts of the Firemen.

New York, April 28.—The slight seeing automobiles will be barred from the streets of Chinatown hereafter by order of Police Commissioner McAduo, who recently expressed himself rather freely on the subject of slumming. No attempt will be made to prevent the sightseers from entering Chinatown afoot, but they will be compelled to leave their conveyances a short distance away on the bowery.

In announcing the new rule, the commissioner holds that the cars are so large that fire fighting apparatus cannot pass them in the narrow streets of the celestial quarters, and that in case of fire, lives would be endangered by the presence of the automobiles.

Officials of the companies conducting the tours declare Mr. McAduo is misinformed as to the size of their automobile and that they will test his order in the courts.

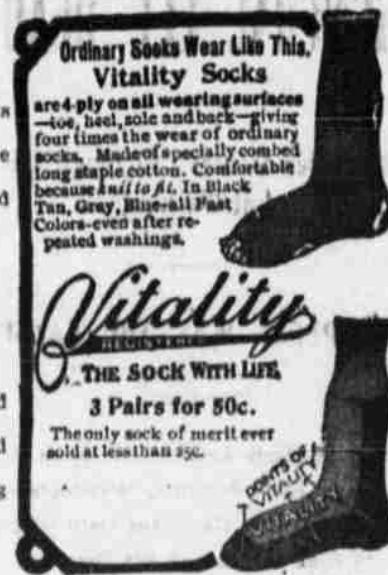

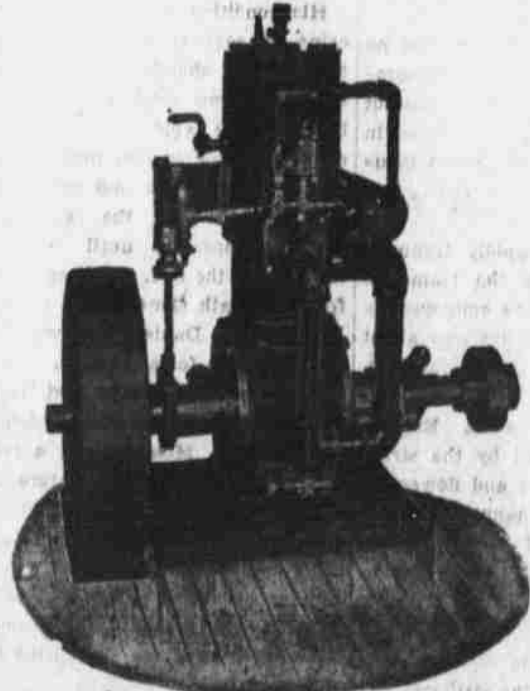
