

E. Gustafson has been awarded a contract for constructing roads and sidewalks around the new barracks building at Ft. Columbia by Capt. Goodale under instructions from the department at Washington. Captain Goodale has also received authority to advertise for bids for replanking the approach to the whart at the fort. a distance of about 2008 feet.

Several gentlemen interested in the completing of the court house are canvassing the situation and report receiving sufficient encouragement to organize the company, suggested by The Astorian. An attorney investigated the proposition and reported that there were no legal obstacles in the way of the proposed construction plan and it is expected that it will be submitted to the county court in some shape next Wednesday.

The fishing season remains about the same. The gill-netters and Bakers bay and Chinook trapmen report no salmon. Chris Henry, who operates the old Sam Oliver seining grounds up the river reports that he is catching about 1600 pounds of salmon a day, and another seining ground near there reports the same. It is thought that on account of there being very few gill nets in the river the salmon are going up the river, which accounts for the catches on the seining grounds and at Oregon City. Most of the salmon are delivered to the cold storage plants.

People of Clatsop county probably do not realize that there is an industry in Clatsop county that is deserving of patronage. R. M.
