

RAILROAD TO GULF

Meeting of Directors of Colorado and Southern Railroad.

INCORPORATED \$100,000,000

Intention of the New Company to Absorb Other Prominent Lines and Build a Railroad from New York to the Gulf of Mexico This Year.

New York, May 9.—At a special meeting in this city the directors of the Colorado and Southern railway have, according to the Herald, adopted radical measures for the carrying out of the program they contemplate in making the Colorado & Southern a thorough line to the gulf.

To this end they decided to incorporate the road in another state and ask the stockholders to authorize a \$100,000,000 bond issue at their meeting in Denver on June 15.

Of the \$100,000,000 in bonds \$37,000,000 are for the purpose of refunding underlying bonds and \$17,000,000 are intended for taking over the Fort Worth & Denver City railway, buying the Trinity & Brazos Valley railway and building 165 miles of new road to Houston, Texas. Among other acquisitions contemplated is the Colorado Springs & Cripple Creek railway. These plans, which have been frequently alluded to recently, will, in a measure, cause a regrouping of railroad interests over a large territory in the southwest.

FALSE IMPRESSION.

Vatican Did Not Discuss Home Rule for Ireland With Redmond. Rome, May 9.—Surprise has been caused at the Vatican by what there is regarded as the exaggerated impression produced in certain circles by Pope Pius' words to John E. Redmond, at the audience which the Irish parliamentary leader had with his holiness on April 27. It is stated on authority that the subject of home rule for Ireland was not discussed at the audience in question, the conversation being

confined to allusions to what may be considered the legitimate aspirations of Irish Catholics. The Pontiff, it is added, expressed the highest appreciation of the reception accorded to King Edward on the occasion of his latest visit to Italy and recommended to Irishmen loyalty to the sovereign and respect for constituted authorities.

USUAL MISUNDERSTANDING.

Head-On Collision in New York Kills One Person.

New York, May 9.—In a head-on collision between two tramway cars on Staten Island 30 persons have been injured. Mrs. Dora Davidson of New York probably will die.

Both cars were well filled with passengers when they came together. The platforms of the cars were battered to splinters and many of the passengers were hurled to the pavement. All were severely cut and bruised except Mrs. Davidson, who was hurt internally. Misunderstanding of signals is said to have been the cause of the accident.

KAISER'S RACE CUP.

Preparations Made for the Great Yacht Race in New York.

New York, May 9.—The 11 yachts entered for the Kaiser's cup race across the Atlantic, from Sandy Hook lightship are being given their final preparations for the contest. By the end of this week all will be ready for the start, on May 16, and a day or so before that time the majority will be at anchor inside Sandy Hook awaiting the official sendaway.

Most of the yachts already have been docked and their auxiliary propellers removed, leaving no means of propulsion except by sail and from now on the crews will be busy taking aboard stores for the long voyage.

EFFECT UPON TRADE

New German Tariff Disastrous to United States.

ADVOCATES A NEW TREATY

The State Department is Daily Receiving Protest From Large Merchantile Establishments Protesting Against the German Discrimination.

Washington, May 9.—Consul General Mason, reporting to the state department upon the disastrous effect upon trade with Germany involved by the new German tariff law which is to go into effect next March, urges "the preparation of a new and carefully drawn treaty of amity which promises a normal and increased reciprocity trade while conserving and protecting the interests of both nations.

Mr. Mason says that it is his opinion Germany is sharply divided on the question whether the most favored nation clause of the German-American treaty will be allowed to continue after the new commercial treaties become effective. The commercial and industrial classes generally, he says, are opposed to a drastic policy which might lead to reprisals and increases the cost of bread.

The state department is daily receiving protests from large American business houses against the new German tariff rates, which they claim will destroy their German export trade.

CROPS LOOK PROMISING.

Oregon Crops Are in Good Condition, But Need Rain.

Washington, May 9.—The weekly crop bulletin says:

On the north Pacific coast the winter wheat continues promising, although some unfavorable reports respecting the lowland wheat has been received from Oregon. The condition of spring wheat is promising, but rain is needed.

INCREASED CAPITAL STOCK.

Union Pacific Files Supplemental Articles of Incorporation.

Salt Lake, May 9.—The Union Pacific Railway Company filed with the secretary of state, amended articles of incorporation increasing the amount of the preferred stock \$100,000,000, as authorized Friday last at a special meeting of the stockholders.

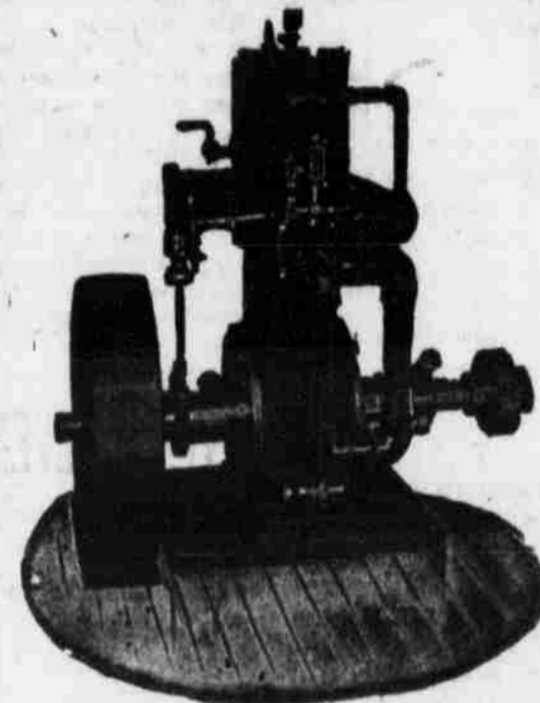
