

SWIPED A DIAMOND

Italian Count Arrested in New York for Petty Larceny.

BROOCH AND COUNT GONE

Man Supposed to Be an Italian Count Lost \$7000 Gambling in Montreal and Had to Steal a Diamond Brooch to Raise Necessary Funds.

New York, May 12.—An Italian giving the name of Count Carlo is under arrest after an exciting chase through Broadway crowds. He is accused of having attempted to replenish his fortunes at the expense of a West Twenty-third street jewelry shop where he was being shown a lot of fine stones. A \$1500 diamond brooch claimed by the shopkeeper was found in his gloves. With an impressive air and aristocratic mien, Neario strolled into the shop and stated in French that he had left his ancestral chateau two days ago to make glad the heart of an American heiress whose smiles he had won on her trip abroad during the winter. All of this was preliminary to the request that he be shown something superlative, as a gift for the girl. Nothing seemed quite good enough and finally the "count" was conducted to a burglar proof cage in which one of the best gems in the shop were exhibited. He selected several fine ones chose a design for their setting and asked a salesman to accompany him to a prominent hotel where he had deposited \$10,000.

Apparently awaiting the salesman, the "count" strolled languidly to the street. When the clerk reached the door his customer had vanished. A quick look at the jewel casket showed that one of the brooches had gone likewise. Two or three clerks rushed into the crowded street and luckily overhauled Carlo four blocks distant slowly walking along Broadway. One of them unceremoniously grasped him by the collar and called him a thief. Carlo shook him off easily and broke into a run. A crowd gathered at his heels and he was soon halted by a mounted officer.

After he had been locked up several hours Carlo told an interpreter that he came to America three weeks ago from Montreal, where he had lost \$7,000, all he possessed.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY.

Special Celebration of Anniversary of Founding of Society.

New York, May 12.—The American Bible Society has held its 99th annual meeting in the Bible house here. Dr. Daniel C. Gilman of Baltimore, president of the society, presided.

Arrangements will be made for a special celebration of the 90th anniversary of the founding of the society in May, 1906. Secretary Haven presented the report of the board of managers. It showed that in the year ending March 31, the society's receipts fell off somewhat. From all sources they amounted to \$63,283. The disbursements were \$610,018 of which \$83,352 were sent to foreign agencies. There were issued 1,831,096 copies of the Bible, New Testament and portions of the scripture. The secretary

CHURCH MODERATION.

Convention of Protestant Churches is Arranged for November.

New York, May 12.—Members of the executive committee and the committee of arrangements for the inter-church conference on moderation have at a meeting here approved plans for a meeting of the representatives of the various Protestant churches of the United States to be held at Carnegie hall, November 15-20. The conference is to be the largest in the history of the Protestant church in America. Delegates from the various denominations will represent 17,000,000 church members.

Addresses were made at the conference by ministers representing various denominations, all of them for conciliation in differences of religious beliefs, and every one hopeful that there is about to be a great religious revival in America.

ATTEMPT TO BURN PRISON.

Fire Bugs at San Quentin Attempt to Burn Jute Mill.

San Rafael, Cal., May 12.—Two desperate attempts have been made to burn the jute mill at San Quentin prison. As a result convict Joseph Davis, serving a three years' sentence for attempted robbery in San Francisco, is in the custody of the sheriff on a charge of arson. Davis has confessed to having made both attempts to burn the mill and Warden Tompkins swore to the complaint against him here before Justice of Peace McGee. His preliminary hearing and trial will be rushed in an effort to make an example of him for the benefit of the other convicts.

FOUND NORTH POLE

Norwegian Counsel Requested to Send Supplies.

NORTH POLE IS DISCOVERED

It is Argued that the Quest of the Arctic Explorers for More Than 400 Years Has Been Rewarded by Finding Magnetic Pole.

Chicago, May 12.—A dispatch to the Record Herald from San Francisco, says:

"The Norwegian consul here has received an order for provisions to be sent north on a whaling arctic explorer, who sailed from Norway on June 17, 1903, in an endeavor to find the northwest passage. From the fact that supplies are to be sent north by the Pacific ocean, it is argued that this great quest of arctic explorers for more than 400 years has been successful and that the explorer will soon appear on the Pacific coast.

Capt. Amundsen, who passed Greenland, bound for King William land, is said to have located the north magnetic pole and to have found the monument erected by Sir John Franklin when that ill-fated expedition perished.

THREATENED POLICE.

Special Immigrant Inspector Fined \$10 for Dereliction.

Buda Pest, Hungary, May 12.—American Special Immigration Inspector Marcus Braun of New York who has been fined \$10 here on charges that he threatened a police department detective whom he alleges was tampering with his mail) declares police stories about his antecedents in Hungary are fictitious. He has reported the incident to the authorities at Washington through the American embassy.

Andrew Carnegie Offers Radcliffe College \$75,000 for Building.

Cambridge, Mass., May 12.—Andrew Carnegie has offered to Radcliffe college \$75,000 for a library building on condition that an equal sum shall be raised among alumnae and friends of the college for endowment of the library. An effort will be made to meet the requirements of the gift.

Buford Runs Aground.

Manila, May 12.—The arm transport Buford ran ashore on May 11 while entering the harbor at Malabang, island of Mindanao. The troops on board were landed. The transport will probably be re-floated without damage.

TEAMSTERS STRIKE

Sixth Week of Endurance Contest in Chicago.

INVESTIGATION IS DEMANDED

Striking Teamsters Considering the Advisability of Opening a Personal Campaign Against the Chicago Employers' Association.

Chicago, May 12.—The teamsters' strike enters upon the sixth week today as an "endurance contest." The employers and the strikers both declare the duration of the controversy now depends solely upon the steadfastness of the other side.

A move which the strike leaders are planning to make has relation to the appeal for a grand investigation of the Employers' Teaming Company. Attorney Seymour Steadman has conferred with President Doid of the Federation of Labor and advised the opening of a "personal" legal campaign against the employers. It was said that Steadman proposed the prosecution of individual employers for the violation of various city ordinances.

Father of Twenty-Seven Children Dies in New York of Old Age.

New York, May 12.—Joseph Lewis, 104 years of age, is dead at his home here. He served, with two sons, throughout the civil war. Lewis was the father of 27 children.
