ORDERS ARE GROWING FAST

Lodges Have Their Ups and Downs, But Each One Shows a Steady Increase in Membership Recruited Principally From Rising Generation.

The grand lodge of New York by an almost unanimous vote determined on biennial sessions hereafter.

The total number of beneficiary certificates in force Dec. 31, 1904, in Michigan was 17,175, 6,029 of which were for \$1,000 and 11,146 for \$2,000.

From the organization of the A. O. U. W. in New York to the present time \$18,000,000 has been paid out to beneficiaries.

KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS.

The Indiana Pythian Building.

The big Pythian building which is to be erected in Indianapolis by the grand lodge of Indiana will contain 264 office rooms, and there will be 8,000 feet of area on the ground floor, to be divided

into storerooms, besides a glass walled arcade. The building will be of steel construction, absolutely fireproof and with every modern appliance and convenience necessary to a structure of this character. It will front 180 feet on Massachusetts avenue, 150 feet on Pennsylvania street, and the north, or base, wall will measure 138 feet. There will be an auditorium of sufficient size to accommodate the convention of the grand lodge. The structure will be ten stories in height and cost \$400,000.

Mountain City lodge of Frederick, Md., will erect a fine Pythian temple in that city.

The District of Columbia now has a Pythian membership in good standing of over 7,000.

ODD FELLOWS.

The Outside and Inside Guards.

In the lodges of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows too little attention is given to the selection of the officers who are stationed at the outer and the inner door, says the Lodge Record. It often happens that the members selected for these positions are those who have little interest in the organization, or, as the general membership says, "Any one who can receive the password is good enough to put at the doors." Close observation demonstrates that the outside and inside guards are among the most important officers of a lodge, and they should be selected with the greatest care, particularly as to fitness to fill the positions.
