been paid, together with the penalty, costs and interests. The penalty and costs will amount to about \$10 on each lot, as each lot has to be advertised and sold separately. He has sixty days in which to make his return to the auditor, and will probably give delinquents about ten days to call at his office and pay the assessments, and save the cost of advertising and sale. The total amount due is \$12,811.75, and the interest amounts to 768.70.
