COUNCIL MEETING

Common Council Meet and Transact Business.

FOR STREET IMPROVEMENT

Fourteenth Street Will Be Improved Providing the Property Owners Do not Object and Alameda Avenue in Uniontown Will be Improved.

The common council met in regular session last evening, the mayor and all members being present.

Petition for retail liquor license Matt Sandstrom, Johnson & Cook Norris Staples and Frank Mansen were read and referred.

Petition from Mrs. E. P. Parker asking to redeem property, tendering \$600 for redemption of property sold for delinquent assessments, was accepted.

Petition from tax-payers for the construction of a sewer on Thirty-eighth street was referred to the street committee.

Communication from Ferguson & Houston to furnish railing and platform in the new city hall for \$330, was read and laid over.

Communication from the Woman's Club calling attention of the condition of the Hillside cemetery, was referred to the committee on public property.

Communication from W. R. Hume relative to the condition of the alleyway in Upper Astoria, also to the condition of Exchange street from the Clatsop Mill west to Seventeenth street, stating that the street was in a dangerous condition, was referred to the street committee.

Communication from Astoria Box Co relative to alleyway in Upper Astoria and Exchange street, was referred to the street committee.

Communication from pound master asking for an allowance of \$2.50 per month for rent of pound, was referred to the committee on health and police.

Communication from Chas. Verseuren relative to the dangerous condition of Ninth street was referred to the street committee.

Communication from Olof Anderson asking for a three days' leave of absence, was granted.

Communication from Olof Anderson, stating that he had turned over to the chief of police the delinquent assessments of streets, with warrant attached thereto for collection, was placed on file.

Bids for electric fixtures for the city hall were read as follows: R. R. Caruthers, \$665.35; H. W. Cyrus, 370.00; M. J. Welch, \$486.75; Electrical Appliance Co., \$486.25. The bid of H. W. Cyrus was accepted and the committee instructed to enter into contract for furnishing the lights.

Committee on ways and means reported on the petition of Matilda Berrendes, recommending that the claim be allowed, was adopted and she was allowed \$10 on her assessment.

Committee on health and police recommended that a liquor license be granted to John Harry.

The committee on streets and public ways recommended that the grades asked for by the Peninsula Land and Trust Company be granted and grades established.

Building permits were granted to Ben Ekoss, Andrew Asp and V. Boeling.

Councilman Kaboth stated that he would appear before the city attorney and swear out warrants for Alex Gilbert and C. H. Page, and the Standard Oil Co. for failing to take out building permits.

Councilman Hansen called attention to the fact that three houses where fire had occurred were putting on shingle roofs, contrary to ordinances.

The auditor reported collections for the month of May amounted to \$249.

A. S. Tee, city surveyor, reported that no estimate had been made for the improvement of Fourteenth street from Grand avenue south. Councilman Hanson stated that the kind of improvement demanded could not be made for the amount of the assessment. The matter was referred to the street committee.

City Surveyor Tee reported that the property on Eighth street would not stand the assessment and the matter was postponed.

Ordinance appropriating \$133 out of the city hall fund for the benefit of Aug. Carlson was laid over.

An ordinance allowing the committee on public property to enter into contract with the Reliance Electrical Works for lights in the city hall for \$370 was passed.

Ordinance accepting the improvement of Duane street and Franklin avenue was passed.

Astor street to the water front was passed.

Ordinance establishing the grade on Thirtieth street was passed.

Ordinance providing for the improvement of Fourteenth street from Grand avenue to Jerome avenue to a width of 20 feet through the center thereof and building wooden sidewalks on each side, was laid over.

Resolution for the improvement of Thirtieth street was adopted.

The city surveyor was instructed to prepare plans for the improvement of Alameda avenue.

There will be a meeting of the park commission tonight at the city hall to consider matters of importance relative to the city park. There is about \$1900 in the park fund and an effort will be made to improve the park, and possibly a portion may be used for the Hillside cemetery.

Seiners from up the river report that the Columbia is very muddy down as far as Cathlamet, due to the recent cloud bursts in eastern Oregon, and they are afraid if it continues that it will seriously interfere with seining operations and may stop them altogether.

The Peniel Mission, who have opened headquarters across from the Astoria Savings Bank on Tenth street, will hold their first meeting tonight. The public are cordially invited to attend. Rev. Trumbull, of the Baptist church, will speak.
