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

Crop Bound Fowls. I have tried the following treatment for crop bound fowls with great success, writes a Virginia farmer in Commercial Poultry: Make an incision in the outer skin about half or three-quarters of an inch long. Pull the outer skin a little to one side and make a like incision in the skin of the crop. Work out all the contents of the crop which obstruct the passage of the gizzard, then sew up neatly with silk thread, sewing each skin separately. Keep the bird penned separately and druggist. Price, 50 cents. feed lightly for a week. I have saved a number of valuable fowls in this way and can recommend it as a sure remedy if done carefully and in time.
