The streets do not present a very lively appearance which is evidence of the fact that everybody is working. There is more building going on than any previous summer and an unusually large amount is projected for this fall.

Dill & Young will today commence driving the piles for the foundation of the new store building to be erected on Commercial street by J. N. Griffin. Work on the building will be commenced as soon as the foundation is completed. It will be occupied by Chas. Heilborn & Son.

J. F. Bourne, as administrator of the estate of James Jenkins, deceased, will on next Monday, sell the personal property of the deceased at Frankfort consisting of 1 large gasoline fishing boat; 1 large mesh fishing net; 1 small mesh fishing net; 1 scow and contents. This sale will take place at 1 o'clock, or will be sold at private sale.

It is reported that John Considine has purchased the interest of S. Morton Cohen in the vaudeville theater circuit, including the Star at Astoria. It is not known when he will take charge of the theaters or whether there will be any change in the management at Astoria. Mr. Gervurtz has built up the Star theater in Astoria by his untiring energy and is a very popular theater manager and will probably be retained.

The committee of the Native Daughters of Oregon will soon commence putting up signs on the old landmarks of Astoria and vicinity, showing all the spots of historical interest. The sign for old Fort George will be placed on the residence at the corner of 15th and Exchange street now owned by L. Kirchoff. Early settlers state that before the residence was built the old chimney of Fort George had to be torn down.

Concomley Tribe of Redmen have awarded contracts for building their new lodge hall on Exchange street. Leander Leabeck was awarded the contract for the foundation; William Miller, the building; R. R. Carruthers, electric lighting; B. F. Allen & Son, painting and Thos. Bush plastering. The bids for plumbing were not awarded as they looked like a combination and were all out of proportion. The building will cost \$3,000.

David Creighton, a stone mason, fell from the second story window of the Bay View hotel about two o'clock yesterday morning. He was sitting in the window when he lost his balance and fell a distance of about twenty feet striking a railing which broke and he fell to the beach below. Medical assistance was summoned, and although no bones were broken and no internal injuries sustained, he is unable to give any lucid account of the accident. It was certainly a very narrow escape.

Poll tax collector Dudley Blount if of the opinion that there are a number of very unpatriotic citizens in Astoria. They go over to Washington and pay their poll tax which is \$2, while they enjoy the benefits of protection in Oregon. They simply send money out of Astoria to Washington in order to save one dollar.
