Work on the new county road around Smith's point will be completed by the first of the month. As the Eighth street road is almost impassible for teams, the new road will be of great benefit to the large number of farmers coming in from Young's river and Lewis and Clark.

An alarm of fire was turned in at noon yesterday for a fire in the building across from the operahouse on Exchange and Twelfth streets. The fire was in the roof and was caused from the terra cotta flues. It was extinguished by the chemical. A few shingles will repair the damage.

Commencing next Sunday the admission to the Lewis and Clark fair will be reduced from 50 cents to 25 cents. A large number of people enjoy spending Sunday at the fair, but as most of the exhibits are closed on that day, there was a general demand for a reduction.

Property owners are paying street assessments more prompt than for several years. \$15,453.38 has been paid in since April 1, most of which is on the streets recently improved. The chief of police has collected considerable on the old street assessments, the time for paying expiring this week, after which the property will be advertised and sold.

Governor Chamberlain has issued a proclamation naming Monday, June 4, 1906, as the time for voting on the referendum petition filed with the secretary of state asking that appropriation bill be submitted to a vote of the people. This is the bill that carries the appropriation for the state normal schools to which considerable objection has been raised.

The Clatsop County Medical Society were royally entertained last evening by the Clatsop Bar Association at the offices of F. J. Taylor and George Noland. It was in the nature of a smoker. Several short speeches were made by the members of both associations on the end of man physically and financially, although the question of fees was not discussed. A very enjoyable evening was spent.

The municipal bonds recently advertised, amounting to \$16,000 brought a premium of about \$175.00. Judge Anderson, in speaking of the matter yesterday, stated that in the financial gazette issued, it shows that many bonds of eastern cities sell as low as 96 cents, showing that Astoria bonds are considered better than bonds in some eastern cities which appear to be prosperous.

The census of Clatsop county has been completed with the exception of New Astoria and precinct No. 3 of Astoria. G. W. Lounsbury is taking the census in No. 3 and also all the canneries and seining grounds and it will require about three weeks to complete it. He expects to enumerate fully 2500 which will bring the total census of the city up to about 12,500. The census of the county will be about 18,000.

There are five criminals in the county jail awaiting trial. Sherman Smith and John E. Miller are held for breaking into cottages at Seaside, C. O. Reiley charged with burglary in the Tongue Point saloon, and C. S. Stockton, who is held on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses. They will probably be indicted, and if they plead guilty, which is very probable, they will be sentenced next week. If any plead not guilty, they can not be tried until the September term of court, as there will be no jury at the June term.

Reports from the fishermen and the canneries yesterday was to the effect that the gillnetters are making fair catches, while the traps and seines were doing better than last year. The cold storage plants are far ahead of last year and there is some talk of their closing down in the near future. The cannery pack is short of last year but with a continuation of the present run, it will not take long for them to catch up. The fishermen report that they are making more money this year than last on account of the large size of the salmon.

Complaint is made by the fishermen that the tug Sampson, in towing barges, does not use ordinary care in protecting the lives and property of fishermen. The accident mentioned in yesterday's Astorian as occurring near Taylor's seining grounds was brought to this by H. A. Hansen. Mr. Hansen says he was lying close to the spar buoy and so was another boat. When the Sampson came down his boat was caught between the steamer and a barge and several ribs were broken out of his boat. He did not see the other boat after the accident, but thinks it certainly must have been run into. One of the barges ran onto the spar buoy and there is a mark on it where it struck.

pet test to ascertain the mineral properties. Short addresses were made by prominent citizens, all favoring the project, and many good offers were made to assist financially. On motion a committee was appointed to make arrangements to ship three car loads of sand, one from Clatsop, one from Seaside, and one from Sand Island. Chairman Welch appointed J. H. Smith, F. A. Fisher and Martin Foard. The committee will meet this morning at 9:30 o'clock at the office of J. H. Smith to make arrangements. It was also suggested that inasmuch as it would require some money to load and unload the sand, that Jas. W. Welch be a committee of one to collect one dollar from every merchant to defray the expenses. Over \$20 was collected in the chamber before the meeting adjourned. The government furnishes the sacks and pays the freight, and the citizens are supposed to furnish the sand. There is no doubt but the sands are rich with iron, platinum and gold, and the experiment may result in bringing a large number of capitalists to Astoria for the purpose of utilizing the sands in manufactured products. Dr. Day has made an experiment of the sand and pronounces it unusually rich in minerals and states that iron can be manufactured in Astoria cheaper than any place in the United States.

NEW ASTORIA WATER.

Efforts Will Be Made by Town Authorities to Secure Water.

The common council of New Astoria are very anxious that the water mains from Astoria be extended to that town. A communication will probably be sent to the common council next Monday night asking them to appoint a committee to confer with a like committee to be appointed by New Astoria for the purpose of having the mains extended. The New Astoria people are willing to grant a franchise over all the streets and pay the same rate as is charged in Astoria. All the water in New Astoria is either surface water or is supplied by rain tanks and the town is growing and would be more prosperous if it had good water supply. It is probable that the common council will accede to the request.
