Judge Trenchard states that the people in the Nehalem are very enthusiastic over road building and there is a determination on the part of the farmers to secure good roads. MEETING A FAILURE.

Mayor Surprenant Only One Present at Park Commission Conference.

Another attempt was made to hold a meeting of the Astoria Park Commission Thursday night, but Mayor Surprenant was the only member that showed up. The commission are anxious to secure title to the tract of land purchased for park purposes from C. W. Shively. The title stands in the name of the Astoria Progressive Association, but that organization is defunct. Mr. Shively holds a mortgage on the property for about \$550. The Push Club have paid \$1300 on the purchase price of the property. The City of Astoria levies an annual tax of one-half a mill for park purposes producing a revenue of about \$900 a year. There is now in the park fund about \$1800, or sufficient to pay off all claims. The Push Club have been asked to transfer the property to the park commission, but being out of existence, it can not be done. The city can not improve the park until it secures title and here the matter rests. The \$1800 in the park fund is lying idle and brings in no revenue, and the object of the meeting was to straighten out the tangle so that the commission can acquire title. The Push Club being out of existence, and those that contributed their money for the purpose not being known, the commission believe that they should donate their interest in the park to the commission. As soon as good title is secured, the commission will commence improving the park.

POLICE OFFICER HONORED.

Sheriff Linville Presents Officer Coffman With Odd Array of Tools.

Appreciating the achievements of Police Officer George Coffman, Sheriff Linville yesterday presented Mr. Coffman with a complete detective outfit consisting of a large belt, with a scabbard for a Colt's army revolver, with a 32 Smith & Wesson, a drift bolt, the same as used by Chinamen, and a knife that has been used for cutting bolognas in a sausage factory. LINN'S UNIQUE BOOTH.

Pavillion at Exposition of Many Varieties of Wood.

Portland, June 16.—One of the most interesting booths in the Agricultural Building at the Lewis and Clark Exposition is that of Linn county. The front of the booth is made of thirty-eight varieties of woods, native to Linn county, while a collection included in the county's display shows eighteen other varieties. The table on which the fruits are displayed were cut from a single log and is five feet wide by twenty feet long and four inches thick. It is of yellow fir, valuable because of the fine grain, which is brought out beautifully by polishing. The different varieties which compose the front of the booth are labeled. The booth has attracted a great deal of attention, especially from Eastern people, who have been surprised to learn that a single Oregon county is so rich in valuable timber.
