CARRIES FIRST OIL

Kilburn Fills Tanks With Crude Product in Astoria.

News of the Marine—Passenger Traffic Heavier Than Usual—Arrivals and Into San Francisco For Repairs.

The first crude oil to be carried from the Standard Oil company's tanks in this city will be taken this morning in the steamer F. A. Kilburn, Captain Thompson, which will clear early for Coos Bay, Eureka and San Francisco.

Steamer Redondo, Captain Ahlin, is due to arrive this morning from San Francisco, with freight and passengers for this city.

Steamer Alliance, Captain Hardwick sailed yesterday, at 11:45 A. M., for Coos Bay and San Francisco. Her freight and passenger lists were full.

Steamer Newport, of the North Pacific Transportation company, which has been expected to arrive here for eight days past, advises say, has put into San Francisco with broken machinery. The Newport was intended to enter into competition with the steamers Kilburn and Alliance.

Steamer Northland, Captain Jameson, is due to arrive, from Redondo, tomorrow.

Schooner Oakland was towed to sea, lumber laden from Tillamook, Friday.

Passenger traffic is heavy, the majority of steamers refusing accommodations. The cause is traced to the vast exodus of tourist traffic from the East occasioned by the Lewis and Clark exposition.

VALUABLE NETS LOST.

Flood-tide Plays Havoc With Paraphernalia of Fishermen.
As a result of an unusual flood-tide off Peacock Spit yesterday a number of Lower-river fishermen are lamenting the loss of their gillnets. According to Captain Parker, of the Nahcotta, who arrived in the city last night, the life-saving crew picked up several nets and returned them to their owners. It is impossible to determine at present how many nets are adrift.
