MRS. CAPTAIN FLAVEL AND DAUGHTERS HAVE RETURNED

Enjoyed Extended Tour in Europe—Will Remain Here During Summer.

Mrs. Captain George Flavel and the Misses Nellie and Katie Flavel, returned yesterday from an extended tour through Spain, Italy, Germany, Hungary, Switzerland and England. Although rather indisposed as a result of the journey across the continent they are enthusiastic over the trip. Miss Nellie Flavel, in an interview, last night, spoke feelingly upon American superiority over Europe, from the standpoint of scenery, saying, with much fervor, "you know they have no such rivers as the Columbia over there." She continued:

"I naturally enjoyed the trip and appreciated the advantages afforded in Europe for study. I do not consider, however, that the scenery in Europe is equal to that of this country. The scenic offerings of Colorado are far ahead of anything in Europe and then," she added loyally, "we have some scenery here in Oregon."

Miss Nellie Flavel, with her sister, has been in Paris for nearly two years. The former studied for the piano under Riera and the latter, singing with Trabolo. Mrs. Flavel joined her daughters in Paris last November. A tour of Europe occupying the entire winter was then commenced. The itinerary included the most important countries of Europe.

From Paris the trio journeyed to Naples, Nice, Rome, Genoa, and Venice. Leaving the latter city, Budapest was reached. This Hungarian city, according to Miss Nellie, is sublimely beautiful, and is graced with many costly and imposing edifices.

The greater part of the time was spent in Interlaken, Switzerland. From here many side trips were made which included a part of the Alps and the famous Jungfrau tunnel. The remainder of the tour provided for a few weeks in Spain. Arriving in New York, late in May, the Flavels crossed the continent leisurely, stopping at Chicago and Colorado Springs en route. They will remain in Astoria during the summer.

STAR CHANGES HANDS.

Local Playhouse Bought By Considine Syndicate.

The Pacific Coast Amusement Co. headed by John Considine, of Portland, and popular Timothy Sullivan, of New York, has been in control of the Star theater here since June 11, with Mr. P. Gevurtz, its former manager, looking after the affairs of the new owners temporarily. Mr. Al Hager, of the Unique, will close his house on Monday and assume charge of the Star.

Mr. Gevurtz will leave with his wife next week for Puget sound cities and then will go East to join S. Morton Cohn in the vaudeville business. Mr. Cohn, who has disposed of his interests in the Star Circuit theaters of the North west, also controls ten vaudeville houses in Pennsylvania. After Mr. Gevurtz joins him, the latter circuit will be extended into other states of the East. The eastern houses are connected under the name "Family Theater."

Mr. and Mrs. Gevurtz have made many friends here since the Star theater was established last August. Their departure is regretted by all who know them. Mr. Gevurtz has done much for high-class vaudeville here, always presenting the best of talent and absolutely clean shows. This has gained him steady patronage of the best families in the city.

If the theater continues to do as well, much of its future success may be attributed to his splendid fundamental work.

JUNIORS TO GIVE RECEPTION

Thirteen Young Astorians Will Graduate—Dr. Stephen S. Wise Will Deliver Address.—Elaborate Program Arranged—Alumni Banquet Friday Night.

The most important event of the coming week will be in High School circles, the Junior reception occurring Wednesday, Commencement Thursday, and the Alumni association banquet, Friday evening. Thirteen of Astoria's young people are about to enter upon the more serious phase of life. They have worked untiringly and conscientiously. The reward for their efforts will be modest sheets of parchment which will be handed them Thursday afternoon by P. J. Goodman, chairman of the Board of Education.

Wednesday, at Fishers' Hall, the Juniors will receive the Seniors. Great preparations are being made for the event, so carefully, in fact, it is only intimated that there will probably be dancing. Other details are not divulged, but the affair promises to be impressive.

Commencement exercises will be held Thursday afternoon in Fishers' Opera House. An elaborate program will be offered. This will include an address by Dr. Stephen S. White, of Portland, who will journey to this city for the occasion. The high school program provides for the valedictory, Miss Esther Larson; Salutation, Miss Rose Matson and two orations by the Misses Lottie Hess and Amy Rannels, the latter's topic being, "A Vision Of The Goal." The opera house will be tastefully decorated, the class and National colors being utilized.

At the Occident hotel, Friday night, the banquet of the Alumni association will occur.
