MARKET...thenha... Portland, June 20.—More grain bags will be needed on the Pacific Coast this year than last, and as the supply is said to be limited, an advance of 7c each has taken place.

The bag season has already opened in Portland, though no shipments have as yet been made into the grain growing districts.

Several million more grain bags will be needed this season, as the wheat and barley crops will be heavy, whereas it was very light last year. Grain bags are made in the California state prison, and also at the Washington institution but not in such numbers as to have any effect on prices.
