Portland, June 28.—Butter continues weak, as a result of favorable conditions in the pastures, and of cool weather, which retards the consumption of ice cream.

Best grades of fancy creamery are sold with more or less difficulty at 20c a pound. Uptown creameries quote their best grades at 21c, or 45c a roll, but in large quantities this price is shaded when opportunity offers.

Some dealers quote Oregon eggs at 21c today, while others are willing to sell what they have on hand at 20c. The arrival of large quantities of Eastern eggs, which are offered at 19c, has a weakening tendency on prices, as many consumers prefer the imported article.

Chickens have been selling readily so far this week. Dealers do not think, however, that the market will stand an advance yet.

Cherries were inclined to be scarce today. Fine weather would have a good effect on the remainder of the cherry crop in Oregon, as the fruit is not yet ripe enough to pick, as a rule.

Oregon hothouse tomatoes are becoming more plentiful, and prices are inclined downward.

Fresh salmon are plentiful, and another run of shad is on.
