

HEAVY SENTENCES

Judge McBride Sends Two Men to the Penitentiary.

THEY WERE BOTH THIEVES

John Schleppl Stole Two Watches and Received One Year. August Carlson Broke Into Home and Made Away With Wearing Apparel, Two Years.

John Schleppl, plead guilty to the charge of stealing two watches, when he was arraigned in the Circuit Court yesterday. He stated that the crime was traceable directly to an ungovernable passion for strong drink; that it was impossible for him to let it alone, although he was but 22 years of age. He believed a term in the penitentiary would do him good. His hands and body trembled when he addressed the court indicating the terrible effects of liquor.

The Court gave him some good advice, admonishing him, that he was yet a young man and possessed more than average intelligence and there was no reason why he should not reform and become an honored and useful member of society.

The Court then sentenced him to one year in the penitentiary.

Gets Two Years.

On April 3 of this year, August Carlson broke into the store of Chrles Larsen at the corner of Fifteenth and Commercial streets and stole several articles of wearing apparel which he sold to a second hand store. He was arrested

and admitted his guilt to the officers. District Attorney Harrison Allen returned a true bill against him yesterday in the Circuit Court to which he plead guilty and was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary.
