Latest Quotations in the Portland Produce Markets.

Complete Market Reports Corrected Each Day Giving the Wholesale Prices of Commodities, Farm Produce and Vegetables.

Portland, July 5.—There are about 10,000 bales of hops in Oregon awaiting sale, but there are no buyers, even at the present low quotations.

A good demand still exists for such stuff as is imported from California lemons are especially scarce as a result of a strong demand East, which diverts a large proportion of the California product from this state.

Chickens continue in good demand and a firm market is looked for the rest of the week. Prices have not advanced however, as receipts continue quite heavy.

Butter continues weak, in spite of the fact that large quantities of cream are being diverted from the creameries to the ice cream freezers, in response to warm weather conditions.
