DILL TAKES BENCH

Accepts Judgeship of New Jersey Court Errors and Appeals.

SACRIFICES LARGE PRACTICE

James Dill Steps From Riches of Corporation Law to Dignified Post After Careful Thought. Influenced by Developments in High Finance.

New York, July 7.—James Dill, in accepting the position of the court of errors and appeals, of New Jersey, the World this morning says, surrenders an income of \$300,000 a year from his law practice to become a judge at a salary of \$3,000.

According to a close friend of Mr. Dill, the step from the riches of corporation law to the comparative dignified post on the bench was taken after mature thought in which the recent scandals of high finance and the demands made upon lawyers to save wealthy clients from the law had weighty influence upon his decision.

ENGLISH PRICES BETTER.

Rates on Rails for Panama Railway Beat Domestic Rates.

London, July 7.—Richard L. Farnham, a director of the Panama railway, who has been in England and on the continent for the past two months looking into the prices of steamers and rails, will be a passenger on the Deutschland, which sails for New York today, taking proposals from British and German firms for rails and from British ship owners and ship builders for steamers.

Mr. Farnham is reticent regarding his mission beyond saying the Panama railway company is looking for three steamers of about 6,000 tons each, and fairly fast, to carry freight and passengers. He says he has succeeded in finding in England six vessels generally complying with the requirements on which he has taken options and that the prices are somewhat below what the vessels could be purchased for in the United States. He also has proposals from seven of the largest ship building firms in Great Britain to build the ships required at prices lower for which they could be built in the United States. The British firms, he said, are prepared to deliver the ships in shorter time than the American builders.

Mr. Farnham found the British prices for rails far below American, while German prices were even lower.

CHICAGO STRIKE SPREADS.

Baggage and Parcel Wagon Drivers Join Teamsters.

Chicago, July 7.—A spread of the teamsters' strike to baggage and parcel companies was possible today as a result of the action of the teamsters' joint council in directing all baggage and parcel delivery drivers to refuse to make deliveries to strike bound concerns. While the joint council was in session the department store drivers' union voted overwhelmingly to continue to strike indefinitely.

Action concerning deliveries by the express companies was taken as a result of the announcement by Judge Holdom that he would issue injunctions today against six concerns, compelling them to deliver goods to "struck" houses.

Although the express companies have been endeavoring to prevent a clash with their drivers it was believed they would not avoid asking them to make deliveries to strike bound concerns. The firms that would be affected by the injunction employ about 450 drivers.

MAGNATE IS PLANNING.

May Amalgamate Railways and Operate Two Trans-Continental Lines.

Ottawa, Ont., July 7.—A Winnipeg dispatch says there is a rumor to the effect that a big scheme is being engineered by James J. Hill to amalgamate the Grand Trunk Pacific, The Canadian Northern and the Great Northern railroad systems. It is even held that the scheme includes the incorporation of the intercolonial, thus making possible the operation of two trans-continental lines, utilizing all the roads mentioned and the proposed extension of Mr. Hill's road, the V. V. & E., in British Columbia.

TO ABOLISH CONNING TOWERS.

Far East War Object Lesson For Naval Constructors.

New York, July 7.—It is reported at the New York navy yard that the conning tower as at present in use on the

United States warships will be discontinued or so modified as to cease to be the central station of the ship's movements. In the recent naval battles in the Far East the Japanese concentrated a heavy fire on the towers, the communicating system was destroyed and some of the Russian ships rendered unmanageable.

Lost Boy Found.

Detroit, Mich., July 7.—Perry Deneau, who was reported to be locked in a car that left Detroit last Tuesday, has returned home. With two other boys he had entered the car voluntarily, requesting another boy to lock the door. The three boys became homesick when they reached Niagara Falls and boarded a freight train for Detroit.

Tourist Tax Not Wanted.

New York, July 7.—The Chamber of Commerce has received a dispatch from the Toronto board of trade stating that the council of that board repudiated the action of the legislative assembly of Quebec in attempting to enforce a prohibitive tax on American commercial travelers.

MAY BE HEIR TO MILLIONS

New York, July 7.—Thomas O'Keefe, a Greentown, N. Y., farmer, has declared he is one of the heirs to the fortune of \$55,000,000 supposed to have been left by Dennis O'Keefe, his cousin, who died some years ago in Texas. Information came from a lawyer in Ireland, who had been searching for heirs in the neighborhood of Kibusch, Ireland, where Dennis O'Keefe lived until 1804, when he sailed for America.

Stevens to Organize Corps.

Washington, July 7.—John F. Stevens, chief engineer of the Panama Canal commission, will reach Washington, the latter part of the week. Before going to the isthmus, Mr. Stevens will organize the engineering work here. Many vacancies in the corps require practically the selection of an entire new staff.

Germany Floats Loan.

Berlin, July 7.—The participation of Germany in the Japanese loan gives great satisfaction to the German public. Most of the principal banks of Berlin and the provinces will take part in the floating of the loan.

BUYS WHOLE TOWN

H. E. Huntington Purchases City of Redondo, Cal.

DEAL WAS UNUSUALLY LARGE

Purchase Price Runs into Hundreds of Thousands. Largest Transfer of Beach Property on Record. May Result in Extensive Improvements.

San Francisco, July 7.—A special from Los Angeles to the Call says:

A large deal in property was consummated when, for a consideration which is not made public but which is known to run into hundreds of thousands of dollars, Henry E. Huntington purchased outright the holdings of the Redondo Improvement company, the corporation which established that beach resort and which has made all of the valuable improvements there. The effect of the deal is that Huntington has practically purchased the town of Redondo.

The tract held by the Redondo company, which consisted of 1,000 acres and nearly the entire holding remains intact. Redondo is situated 18 miles from Los Angeles and has two electric and one steam railroad to that city.

Strike at Limoges.

Limoges, France, July 7.—There is a renewed strike agitation. The men in the most important shoe manufacturing have been summoned to preserve order.

Not Allowed to Meet.

Sebastopol, July 7.—The chief of police has forbidden meetings in the district and has notified the people not to congregate as the troops will fire without warning should it be necessary.

GUEST IS MARRIED

Fourth Son of Lord Wimborne Takes Bride.

WILL NOW LIVE IN CANADA

Weds Mrs. Flora Bigelow Dodge, Groom Related to Duke of Marlborough, Duke of Roxborough and Winston Churchill. Ceremony is Simple.

Chicago, July 7.—A dispatch to the Tribune from Sioux Falls, S. D., says: Mrs. Flora Biglow Dodge, formerly of New York city, and the Hon. Lionel George Guest have been married here. The groom is the fourth son of Lord Wimborne, of England, and the First Duke of Marlborough, Duke of Roxborough and Winston Churchill. The wedding ceremony was performed by the Rev. J. H. Hutchison, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church.

Mr. Guest and his bride immediately departed for the East. They will make their home on an island in the St. Lawrence river, near Montreal.

WOMAN EXPLORING LABRADOR

Follows Trial of Her Husband Who Died on Trip.

North Adams, Mass., July 7.—Rev. James E. Sawyer, of Williamstown, has received a letter from Mrs. Leonidas Hubbard now following the trail of her husband who died while exploring Labrador, in which she says that she has inadvertently met A. Wilton Wallace who was with her husband when he died and who is again exploring Labrador.

When Wallace returned to this country there was some friction between him and his dead companion's wife and after he had announced his intention of making a second trip Mrs. Hubbard started out herself, but kept her plans from Wallace.

The letter states that at Gillisport, Wallace turned toward Northwest River. Mrs. Hubbard remained to complete her final arrangements before entering the interior.

TERRIBLE EFFECT OF DUNNITE

New York, July 7.—That a 12-inch shell loaded with only small charge of dynamite, the world's most effective explosive, will explode in the side of the heaviest armor clad vessel though the shell falls short of its mark by twenty feet, has just been demonstrated at the beginning of a series of tests at the government proving grounds at Sandy Hook.

French Expenditures.

Paris, July 7.—The budget for 1906 introduced in the chamber of deputies today showed increased expenditure of \$25,400,000 compared with 1905. The minister does not propose increased taxation, calculating a small surplus from existing taxes.

Transfer Tax Reenumerative.

Albany, N. Y., July 7.—The returns from the first month during which the new stock transfer tax has been in operation indicate an annual revenue of \$5,000,000 which is greater than even the most sanguine advocates of the law expected.

Swiss Thunderstorms Fatal.

London July 7.—The correspondent of the Daily Mail at Geneva says that several persons have been killed or injured by violent thunderstorms which prevailed throughout Switzerland.

Neutral Shipping Protected.

Vienna, July 7.—The Russian Ambassador has notified the foreign office that all necessary steps have been taken to protect neutral shipping in the Black Sea.
