### MAKE GRAVE CHARGE

May Have Tamped With Witnesses for Prosecution.

### SENSATIONAL INFERENCES

Judge Bennett Objects to Pointed Interrogation of Witness in Land Fraud Trials and is Sustained by Court. Trial is Progressing.

Portland, Or., July 8.—Sensational inferences that the defense in the case of ♦ and Biggs has tamped with the witnesses of the prosecution are in the air and the direct question to Green Beard United States vs. Williamson, Gessner this morning, if he had not been told by the defense, that if he testified right there would be money in it, was headed off by the interference of Judge Bennett counsel for the defendants. The objection was sustained by the court and the witness kept from answering.

Beard and his son are Crook county ranchmen and employes of Williamson and Gessner, and testified that they took claims with the assistance and suggestion of Gessner and with the understanding that upon the final proof of entry the men would be paid \$75 clear for their right.

A letter, only less damaging to the cause of the defense than the famous "Burn this Letter" of Senators Mitchell, was introduced by District Attorney Heney this morning, being written by Dr. van Gessner to Henry Beard advising that he relinquish his timber claims. The department has a tip on the business, and "I have got to get out from under the whole thing."

**CONVENTION OF PENSION EXAMINING SURGEONS**  
 Convened in Chicago for Two Days' Session.

Chicago, July 8.—The National Association of pension examining surgeons has convened here for a two days' session with 125 pension examiners, representing 4,500 members of the pension boards in attendance.

In order to further the movement toward doing away with whatever friction exists between the pension board and the pension authorities at Washington, Dr. Sam Houston, referee of the pension bureau, was invited to attend the convention.

The convention will be devoted largely to the reading of papers of diseases peculiar to the old soldiers.

### TWO ENGINEERS CUT BY MEXICAN

Quirque, Mexico, July 8.—Gilbert Johnson, chief mining engineer for Thomas W. Lawson, in California, has been stabbed to death by a peon named Rocha.

Louis N. Rahn, manager of the Lawson company of Mexico, was stabbed by Rocha and left for dead, but will recover. Rocha quarreled with Rahn over \$3 which the Mexican claimed to be due him, and Johnson came to Rahn's aid.

### PICKETING RESUMED.

Chicago teamsters Seem Determined to Continue Strike.

Chicago, July 8.—The resumption today of extensive picketing in the teamsters' strike promised to recall some of the violent scenes which characterized the earlier days of the conflict.

"The duties of the pickets," explained T. J. Ryan, business agent of the department stores drivers' union, "will be simply to watch and seek information. There will be no attacks upon either non union drivers, or deserters from the Union. It is not necessary that the leaders know absolutely the conditions existing in the strike bound houses in order that they may conduct the strike intelligently."

### DENIES ALLEGATIONS

Says Western Union Did Not Sell Racing Information.

New York, July 8.—William J. Dealy, superintendent of the commercial news department of the Western Union telegraph company and David B. Mitchell, manager of the special wire bureau of

the same company, have made affidavits, sworn to before a notary public, denying a published statement charging the Western Union telegraph company with selling racing information to pool rooms. Mr. Mitchell denies that the Western Union telegraph company furnishes racing information directly or indirectly to any news company or pool room, within the city of New York.

### WASHINGTON BAR ELECTS OFFICERS

Meeting at Spokane. Delegates to American Bar Association.

Spokane, July 8.—The state bar association last night elected the following officers: President, F. H. Brownell, of Everett; first vice-president, E. C. Hughes, Seattle; second vice-president, R. S. Holt of Tacoma; third vice-president, A. G. Avery, Spokane; fourth vice-president, C. C. Gose, Walla Walla; secretary, C. Will Shaffer, of Olympia; treasurer, N. S. Porter, of Olympia.

### GUARD SHOTS CONVICTS.

Attempted to Step Out of Line and are Promptly Shot.

Sacramento, Cal., July 8.—News has just been received here that two convicts were shot at the state prison at Folsom last Monday for stepping out side the line while being marched into the prison in the evening. Each man received a bullet wound in the leg and both are in the prison hospital. The men will recover.

The men who were shot were Convicts Gray, of Los Angeles, sent up to serve three years, and Convict Johnson, from Stockton, sentenced to serve 220 years.

### Die of Injuries.

Providence, R. I., July 8.—Giovanni Montrate and Leonardo Quatronomo 18 years old, of Westerly, died at the Rhode Island hospital yesterday. They were employed at the Clark thread mill and while walking on the track yesterday morning were struck by a train. They were hurled 50 yards and sustained fractured skulls.

### LARGEST DRY KILN

On Coast for Tongue Point Lumber Co.

Will be Double Capacity

Of Present Kilns and Will Give Work to Twenty Five Extra Men. New Refuse Burner Rapidly Nearing Completion. Many New Improvements.

The Tongue Point Lumber company which has been closed down for the past week to allow the crew to celebrate the Fourth of July in a befitting fashion will resume operations tomorrow. The Tongue Point Lumber company is at the present time making extensive improvements, chief among which is a large dry kiln of double the capacity of the present kilns. This will employ at least twenty-five extra men. When completed. The new refuse burner is well under way and is the most modern and up-to-date on the Coast. A new boiler will also be installed to give additional power.

### Occasional Skirmishes.

Tokio, July 8.—1 P. M.—The following official dispatch has been received from the Japanese army headquarters in Manchuria: "Occasional collisions take place between scouts on both sides of the railroad along the Fenghua, Kai-yuen and Kwangping roads. The enemy is being gradually driven northward."

### Hay Barges Ablaze.

New York, July 8.—Fire on several hay barges in the North river, has furnished a spectacular and dangerous blaze. Fire boats fought the flames which were extinguished after a long and difficult fight. One of the blazing barges drifted alongside the Cunard steamer Slavonia, which was scorched by the flames. Commodore Perry's ship, the Roosevelt, had a narrow escape.

### HAMMOND A VISITOR

Here With Prominent Eastern Railway Officials.

### OUT ON JUNKETING TRIP

Make Tour of Inspection of A. & C. R., and Visit Various Points of Interest Railway Magnate Will Say Nothing About Extension.

A. B. Hammond, president of the A. & C. R., and the C. & E., accompanied by his life-long friend, President Stickney, of the Chicago and Great Western railway, G. B. McLeod, L. B. Seely and J. S. Wattle, of Omaha, arrived in the city yesterday in President Stickney's private car after a tour of inspection of the company's lines. En route Seaside, Fort Stevens and points of interest on the West side were visited. Superintendent McGuire of the A. & C. R. accompanied the officials.

Reports have been given out that the object of Mr. Hammond's visit was to take under consideration the extension of the A. & C. R. to Nehalem and to Tillamook. Mr. Hammond, however, assures the Astorian that the trip was merely a junket. He was reluctant to say anything relative to the proposed road from Portland to Tillamook through Hillsboro.

Regarding the possibility of the A. & C. R., extending its lines Mr. Hammond remarked that he could say nothing as yet, but following a trip he is about to make through the Pacific Northwest he might divulge something of interest. Mr. Hammond and his party left last night for the exposition city. From there they will travel through Washington, Idaho and Montana. Mr. Hammond expects to return to Astoria in about a month.

### Woman With Hammer.

Brooklyn, July 8.—Mrs. Lizzie Newell, of Brooklyn avenue and Avenue C, was before Magistrate Vorhees in the Flatbush Court this morning charged with assaulting Kate Bannon, of Canarsie lane and Nostrand avenue, by striking her on the head with a hammer on June 29. Mrs. Newell denied the charge and was paroled for examination on July 12.

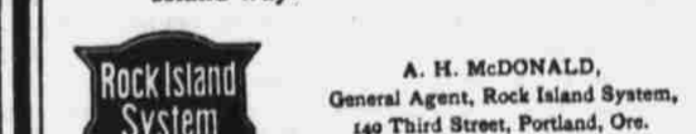
