Portland, July 12.—Fresno watermelons are now won their way to Portland in carload lots, and the price is expected to go down to \$1.75 per 100 pounds when they come.

Grain sacks are still considered stiff at 7 1/2 cents, although California is not going to need nearly so many as was thought two months ago.

Potato shippers are preparing to do a heavy business this year, and a half of big crops raised in Oregon.

New freight rates on fruits and vegetables to go into effect July 15. The increase will be to 45 cents per 100 pounds. This is considered a heavy advance, as present rates are only 25 cents per 100 pounds.
