BANK IS RAIDED

Post Office Officials Pounce On Chicago Concern.

PAPERS ARE CONFISCATED

Imperial Bank, Conducted by Louis Gourdain, John H. Dalton, Under Indictment for Operating a Lottery. Bank Transferred to Postoffice.

Chicago, July 12.—United States government officials have raided the Imperial bank, one of the institutions conducted by Louis Gourdain, and John H. Dalton, now under indictment for operating a lottery. The search warrants were issued by Judge Bethea on the complaint of Inspector Ketcham of the post-office department.

Accompanied by United States deputy marshals, Inspector James E. Stewart entered the bank armed with a warrant, and proceeded to confiscate everything in the shape of books, papers, literature, tickets and such other articles as were thought necessary to be used in evidence. A wagon backed up to the door and the "bank" was transferred to the post-office store house.

The federal search warrant called for "all articles of literature, tickets, papers, books, etc., and labeled or belonging to the Louisiana banking company, Louisiana State Loan & Trust Co., Victor C. Lopez, and company, W. J. Morgan & Co., Louis Gourdain, Imperial banking company, Imperial bank and the Manhattan Exchange bank.

The trial of the "bank" officials will come up before the federal court at the next session in September. The articles confiscated will be introduced as evidence in the trial.

MURAVIEFF WILL NOT SERVE

St. Petersburg, July 12.—M. Muravieff has resigned his position as chief peace plenipotentiary. It may be regarded as practically certain that he will be replaced by M. Witte, the president of the committee of ministers, who all along has been considered a Russian statesman pre-eminently qualified to undertake the difficult task of negotiating peace with Japan.

WHOLESALE EXECUTION.

Sixty Bandits and Cut Throats Hanged Near Fusan, Korea.

San Francisco, July 12.—A story of wholesale execution at the little village of Tai Kiu, a hundred miles inland from Fusan, Korea, was brought to San Francisco Monday by the Rev. E. F. McFarland, a missionary who came home on the steamer Korea. In less than a week sixty men, charged with being bandits and cut throats were hanged by order of the Japanese government. A party of Korean soldiers were the executioners.

For many months a band of outlaws had been robbing and murdering in the country surrounding Tai Kiu. The situation became so serious that the Japanese instructed the extermination of the offenders. The commission was instructed to a detachment of Korean warriors who caught the men and hanged them.

FAVORS SHORTER COURSE.

Cornell Coach Suggests Change in Inter-Collegiate Run.

Ithaca, N. Y., July 12.—Charles E. Courtney, coach of the Cornell university, has placed himself on record as being emphatically in favor of shortening the distance of intercollegiate varsity races from four to three miles. His strong argument against the present distance is that no college man should be asked to do the necessary training for the distance at the risk of his health and to the detriment of his university work as it is almost impossible for an oarsman to keep up the latter when he spends so much time training for the boat.

REGULATES ADULTERATION.

Secretary of Agriculture Issues Order Governing Sale of Impure Foods.

New York, July 12.—Secretary of Agriculture Wilson has sent out a circular letter in regard to a large amount of adulterated food-stuffs imported since the pure food law went into effect.

and which have been held up because the bureau of chemistry of the department found that all kinds of adulteration had been practiced.

Secretary Wilson's order modifies a firmer one in which he declared that the goods must all be sent back to Europe. A number of the largest wholesale grocers in New York, who were concerned in the importations made a strong case pleading a misunderstanding of the law. The secretary's order which arrived at the New York customs house today, provides that goods already imported shall not be sent back but may be sold in this country.

He orders however, that cans of peas colored with sulphate of copper shall be distinctly labeled so as to show this fact, various strawberry jams shall be labeled reading "artificially colored" and some canned mushrooms must be sold as "stems and scraps."

TO FURTHER BOYCOTT.

Chinese Circulate Exhortations in South China Provinces.

Victoria, B. C., July 12.—Mail advices from Hongkong tell of a novel plan of campaign adopted by Chinese in South China to further the boycott movement against United States merchandise. Wealthy Chinese of Tekhoi, in Sanning district, have imported thousands of Japanese fans on one side of which they have had rough sketches printed of Americans roughly treating Chinese and on the other side sketches of buffaloes being beaten and ill used are printed. Letters accompany the pictures calling upon the Chinese to fight the Americans by boycotting their goods. The fans are being widely circulated in South China.

LET'S BIG CONTRACT

Havana Central Will Install Large Interurban System.

TO COST FIVE MILLIONS

Will Radiate From City of Havana and Cover Extensive Territory. To Operate Trains. Electricity Will Be The Power.

New York, July 12.—The Havana Central railway company has awarded to a prominent electrical company contracts for the construction and equipment in Cuba for the largest electrical railway system ever initiated by American interests outside of the United States.

The company is to build and operate a net work of interurban lines radiating from the city of Havana and covering an extensive territory in the interior of the island, which has hitherto been without transportation facilities. About 125 miles will be constructed at first, involving an expenditure of nearly \$5,000,000.

The road besides its passenger traffic will inaugurate a freight service.

The power house to be constructed in Havana will generate 700 horsepower of electric energy at 915,000 volts, three current for the purpose of operating the new lines. Steam turbines will be used, this being the first instance of such equipment being called for in the West Indies. The entire system is expected to be in operation within 15 months.

WANTS TRUSTEE REMOVED.

Son of Brewer Stevenson gets Injunction Against James McClenahan.

New York, July 12.—On the application of David Stevenson, son of the brewer of that name, who died in 1892, Supreme Court Justice Blanchard, issued yesterday a temporary injunction restraining James McClenahan, the trustee of the brewer's estate, from interfering in any way with the young man's one seventh interest, which McClenahan holds in trust for him, except to collect the rents and turn them over to him.

Young Stevenson has begun for an action for the removal of McClenahan as trustee, and for an accounting of the moneys that have passed through the trustee's hands. Stevenson charges the trustee with using the principal of the trust estate for his own benefit. The elder Stevenson left property worth about \$2,500,000, which, after providing for the widow, he divided equally among his children. Mrs. Stevenson died some years ago and also divided her property among the children.
