TRAFFIC IS HEAVY

St. Paul Arrives in With Many Passengers for Fair.

FREIGHT CARGO IS HEAVY

Steamer Five Hours Late, Result of Delay in Leaving San Francisco and Headwinds Encountered on Way Up—Discharges Much Freight Here.

Steamer St. Paul arrived in yesterday with every berth filled and a cargo considerably heavier than any carried for a number of years. Delay in leaving San Francisco and head winds encountered all the way up the coast caused her to reach here about five hours late. Aside from this the passage was uneventful. Several hours were necessary in which to discharge an exceptionally large consignment of freight for this city. In this period the passengers poured from the vessel and enjoyed a short respite from the monotony of steamer life visiting various points of interest about the city, especially the salmon canneries.

Potter Carries Crowd.

Traffic yesterday on the Potter yesterday was unusually heavy, a large number of the passengers being Easterners seeking the coast to escape the humidity at Portland. A great many members of the Washington and Oregon druggists' association were aboard for North Beach, where they had a general good time. On the way down the river A. F. Sheldon, the advertising man was prevailed upon to deliver an address in the cabin, which was heartily received. Traffic on the return trip was equally as heavy.

Steamer Sue H. Elmore leaves out at 7 o'clock this morning for Tillamook carrying a general cargo and passengers.

Oil tank steamer Atlas left out yesterday for San Francisco.

Steamer Newport left out yesterday for San Francisco carrying freight and passengers.

U. B. Scott a Visitor.

U. B. Scott, the veteran steamboat man of Seattle, arrived in the city last evening and will remain several days. He is contemplating bringing his new steamer Telephone around from the sound, providing he can secure sufficient patronage and wharf room in this city.

Steamer Redondo arrived in yesterday from San Francisco. She will load lumber and return to the California port.

Steamer Despatch will leave out this morning for San Francisco, carrying freight and passengers.

Revenue cutter Mugh McCulloch will leave out today for San Francisco responding to orders received from the treasury department.

Contract Awarded.

A. S. Reed yesterday awarded a contract to L. Lebeck to drive the foundation for his three story new building to be erected on the corner of Eleventh and Duane streets. Mr. Lebeck will commence immediate work on the foundation and expects to have it completed by the first of August. The contract will be awarded in a few days for the building. It will be 30X100.

Killed At Westport.

The body of Ole J. Larsen, an employee of the Westport mills was brought to this city yesterday morning. Larsen was engaged in cutting off a corner of the head blocks close to a large timber. He was warned to look out for the timber but apparently paid no attention to it. Suddenly the timber fell striking Larsen in the back, pinning him to the carriage, crushing in his breast over the heart. Workmen raised the timber from him and he walked a short distance and as he was about to fall, was

assisted by the men. He died in about ten minutes without uttering a word. Coroner Pohl was notified and investigated the matter and concluded it was necessary to hold an inquest. The body was prepared for shipment to Watoma, Wisconsin, where his parents reside. He was 31 years of age, unmarried and had only recently come to Westport.

Struck With a Rock.

A complaint was filed in the justice court yesterday and a warrant issued for the arrest of Charles Hull, a farmer residing near Chadwell on the Lewis and Clark. Tony Anderson is the complaining witness. He alleges that while he was riding along the road last Sunday afternoon, Hull, without any provocation, threw a rock at him, cutting his lip and knocking two or three teeth loose. Constable Utringer left out yesterday and arrested Hull. He will be given a hearing in the justice court this morning at 10 o'clock.

Brush Fire.

Someone started a brush fire on the Pipe Line road about a mile east of the water reservoir and it was burning fiercely all day yesterday, filling the air with smoke. The land has been burned over before, but there is valuable timber east of the fire and if it spreads considerable damage may be done. There is a strict law against setting fires and if timber is to be protected it will have to be enforced.

Bit by a Beaver.

Dr. O. B. Estes was called out early yesterday morning to attend a woman residing in the lower district who had been bitten by a mountain beaver, or "woodchuck" as they are called. There was no danger from poison as the system of the victim was well protected by aqua fermenti which probably acted as an antidote to any poisonous influences.
