Portland, July 25.—Butter has advanced with this city's creameries, and is considered firm as a result of scarcity.

Uptown creameries have advanced their price from 25c a pound, or 50c a square, but this butter is sold in lots of a few squares up, and delivered to all parts of the city.

Chickens are not reaching this city in large numbers thus far this week, and no difficulty is found in disposing of all that come in.

Oregon eggs are in better receipt the past few days, and the market is considered weak. Large quantities of Eastern eggs are on sale at 20c 21c.

Potato growers are not so eager to send in shipments as they were, on account of low prices.

Lemons are very high and likely to go higher. The hot wave cast has made a heavy demand on the lemon stock of California.
